DO YOU "hesitation glide" or
"sensation scroll"? No?
Can you do the "combination one-step"? No?

Then get thee to a trottery for we are going to dance with our feet this winter instead of with our bodies, and these dances are to be the most popular of the season, according to the edict of the American Society of Professors of Dancing.

Also the terrible turkey trot and the tango are to be thrown into the discard and in their place is to come a modified form of dancing, including the "Beverly," the "shadow," the "Manchester," the "modified tango," the "side drop glide" and others of a more sane character.

Since Dame Fashion has decreed that debutantes shall be equipped properly each season for modern ballroom dances, the American Society of Dancing Masters, the members of which are the who's who of the polite dancing world, meet in New York once a year, and theirs is the last word concerning what society shall dance in the winter. The society which recently ended its thirty-sixth annual convention was founded 40 years ago by Professor Rivers' father.

This season it has been decided to eliminate the turkey trot and to accept the tango only in a modified form. The society has decided to eliminate from the ballroom all motion of the shoulders, and instead of a close contact and hugging between partners the bodies are to be held more erect with the hands extended at the sides. Scrapping from the hips will not be permitted, nor will hopping and jumping and gripping of the knees.

Professor Rivers said that while the change has been on its way for a year, he observed it more decidedly at Newport, Narragansett Pier and Watch Hill this summer, where he had been teaching, in preparation for the winter season.

"I have observed a wonderful improvement since last winter," said Mr. Rivers. "People have come to realize that what they have been doing is not exactly right. The fun is all over and they want something more refined, something with more character. Popular fancy still retains the one-step because the music is full of animation, but the ambition of society now is to look well on the ballroom floor, and that can be done only in the old dances."

Persons in Newport society, such as Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish, of New York, and Mrs. Harry Darlington, of Pittsburg, came to me last summer and asked me if I could not invent something to take the place of the unbecomable turkey trot. I gave the matter considerable thought and then introduced to them the "combination one-step." When I taught it to them I called special attention to the position in holding and the carriage of the bodies. It permits easy dancing with varied steps and combines grace with comfort.

"It caught on at once, Newport was particularly pleased with it, as it was with the 'Hesitation Glide' because it calls for partners facing each other and a conversation can be kept up while going through the steps. So pleased were the Newport folks with the new dance that at the end of the season they engaged me to go to the north shore, near Boston, where I taught twelve hours each day in Beverly, Manchester and other places.

"Wherever the two dances have been introduced they have at once become popular, and I predict that they with the 'Sensation Scroll,' which has been accepted by the Dancing Masters' Association, will be the rage of the country before the winter is over."
