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UNITED STATES SENDS ONE MORE WARNING TO HUERTA

Looks With Displeasure on any Injury to Mexican Deputies Under Arrest.

REBEL TROOPS MOVE ON CHIHUAHUA CITY

No Increase in Number of Warships of U. S. in Mexican Waters.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 13.—After a conference between Secretary Bryan and President Wilson today it was announced that the White House had telegrams had been dispatched to both John Lind at Vera Cruz and to Charles d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy at Chihuahua City, to make representations to the Huerta government that the United States would look with displeasure on any injury to the Mexican deputies now under arrest. It has been left entirely to Lind's discretion whether he should return to Mexico City to impress these views on the Mexican authorities, but Charge d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy has been directed to address himself to the minister of foreign relations and make it plain that the United States attaches the greatest importance to the arrest of the deputies and is keenly interested in what would be their fate.

President Wilson told callers today that with the present state of affairs he did not see how a constitutional election could be held in Mexico.

So far as the immediate policy of the United States is concerned, it was made plain by the President today that there would be no departure from the original position that Mexico should settle its own affairs. There are no plans today for any increase in the number of American warships in Mexican waters.

TROOPS MOVE ON CHIHUAHUA

Rebels on Way to Torreon to Join Villa in Campaign.

EL PASO, Oct. 13.—Juan Dozal, with 600 well armed Sonora troops and Major Acosta, with 400, are near Palomas, moving upon Chihuahua City. The rebels say a large force of Sonora troops will follow into Chihuahua in the movement to that state and join Villa at Torreon in the campaign to the South.

TO RETIRE FROM COMMISSION.

Chas. A. Prouty to Become Director of Physical Valuation of Railroads.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 13.—Charles A. Prouty will retire in the near future as a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission to become a Director of physical valuation of railroads.

DEATH LIST NOT KNOWN

Carmania Arrives in England With Some Survivors of the Volturno Disaster.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

FISHGUARD, Oct. 13.—The Carmania, the first of the rescuing vessels on the scene of the Volturno disaster, arrived here this afternoon. Captain Barr met the newspaper correspondents with a positive refusal to say a word about the Volturno until the Carmania had reached Liverpool and he had delivered his report to the Cunard Company. He referred his interviewers to the ship's bulletin, but this has already been transmitted by wireless and published.

The Carmania's bulletin says six small boats were launched from the Volturno; that two of them, with 35 persons each on board, got away and that the others were smashed against the ship's side and all occupants perished. Hope of saving any from the Volturno had been almost abandoned when the sea suddenly moderated, permitting the transfer of passengers.

It will be necessary to check up the list of the saved on all the boats that assisted in the rescue before it will be known how many perished.

ORDERS BOND FORFEITED.

Jack Johnson Said to Have Taken Out Citizenship Papers in France.

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—The forfeiture of Jack Johnson's personal bond of \$30,000 was ordered today by Federal Judge Carpenter, effective next April, if the negro prize fighter, who is reported to have taken out citizenship papers in France, does not appear for trial under the Mann white slave act.

HOBSON ATTACKS UNDERWOOD

Charges that Democratic Leader Obtained Support at Baltimore Under False Pretenses.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 13.—Representative Hobson today launched a hot attack against the Senatorial campaign of Democratic Leader Underwood when he charged in the House that his support of the Underwood Presidential candidacy at the Baltimore convention was obtained under false pretenses. Hobson, himself a candidate in the present Alabama contest, referred to the printed reports of a recent speech in which he charged Underwood was a tool of Wall street and the liquor interests, and read from the Senate investigation of campaign contributions the testimony of Senator Bankhead, con-

taining the record of a contribution of \$35,000 from Thomas F. Ryan, and Bankhead's statement that Underwood had not known who financed his campaign.

Underwood replied to Hobson, who repeated his charges, with emphasis. After answering Hobson's general and specific charges, Underwood, swaying in his place to face every member present, demanded: "Is there any other man in this chamber who believes the charges, that I am or ever have been, a tool of Wall street?" "No! No!" shouted members on both sides.

Hobson attempted to interrupt Underwood, but desisted when members shouted, "Sit down, you've had your time." Underwood continued and said every candidate for President received contributions from wealthy men. "Were they tools?" Underwood asked.

FIND COAL IN BIG TUNNEL

Small Vein of Good Quality Said to Have Been Discovered Near Schofield.

SCHOFIELD, Or., Oct. 13.—That a thin vein of bituminous coal, averaging several inches in thickness, has been pierced in the tunnel is the report of several who are in a position to know. The product is said to be equal to the Beaver Hill coal, but not of sufficient quantity for mining. It is possible that a paying streak may be found when the south portal is under ground.

CLOSE SALOON FOR OFFENSE

MAYOR STRAW SHUTS UP SYEVAR ON NORTH FRONT STREET FOR VIOLATING SATURDAY NIGHT CLOSING LAW.

Because Proprietors Edmund and Parker failed to close the Syevar saloon on North front street Saturday night at 12 o'clock, Mayor Straw this afternoon ordered Policeman Richardson to close the saloon and keep it closed until after the next Council meeting, a week from tonight. The City Council will pass on the question.

Saturday night Officer Gordon Smith notified that they did not close at 12 and about five minutes afterwards walked in and told them. He says they would not pay any attention and he went out and called Night-watch Shoupe to assist him, the saloon being crowded. At ten minutes after twelve when they returned, they declare drinks were still being served. It is understood that Parker and Edmund say that they did not hear the going and did not know that Smith had authority to tell them to close.

HAMMERBURG PASSES AWAY

Well-Known Coos County Pioneer Succumbs—Funeral at Coquille Wednesday.

BANDON, Ore., Oct. 13.—J. W. Hammerburg, one of the best known pioneers of Coos County, died at the Bandon hospital this morning after a short illness. He would have been seventy-four years old December 17.

Mr. Hammerburg was a pioneer logger of the Coos Bay section in the early 70s and later became a leading lumberman and mill man of the Coquille, being for a time interested with Adam Pershkeker, the Prosper pioneer. Mr. Hammerburg retired from active work about six years ago.

Mr. Hammerburg married Miss Alice Lowe, a member of the well known pioneer family of Coos County. She died about thirty-four years ago and her sister, Mrs. A. D. Welcott, and brother, Frank Lowe, reside in Marshfield.

Mr. Hammerburg was born in Sweden and came to Coos County about 1863. He moved to the Coquille Valley about 1875 and on Christmas eve 1879, he married Miss Lowe at the home of her parents, Judge and Mrs. D. J. Lowe. On October 1, 1880, she died.

Mr. Hammerburg was a charter member of some of the Coos County Masonic bodies, worked high up in the order and was a member of the Shrine. He has no near relatives here, but a brother resides in Cleveland.

The funeral will be held at Coquille Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock and will be under the auspices of the Masons.

NEW LAND DISCOVERED IN ARCTIC OCEAN BY RUSSIAN

WILL DEPOSE MAYOR STRAW

Gov. West's Plan for Court Martial Fail, So He Starts New Scheme Again.

Dr. Straw, when he heard of Gov. West's last personal attack upon him, the threat to depose him as a member of the Oregon Naval Militia Board, said he wondered why the Governor was after him continually now. He said that he had aided in organizing the Naval Militia and that the people of this community had contributed considerable to it. As to his appointment, he said that he had accepted it only after earnest solicitation by Governor West, who wished him to help straighten out the Portland tangle and then was assured by Governor West that it would not be necessary for him to attend all the meetings, it being so difficult to get to Portland or Salem from Coos Bay.

Dr. Straw said: "I have earnestly endeavored to carry out the wishes of the Governor and other members of the State Naval Board and I know of no conduct of my own unbecoming an officer of the State Naval Militia or unbecoming a citizen. I can hardly believe that the Governor would make an accusation of this kind without first notifying me according to the laws governing the State Naval Militia. "However, my respect for my commander in chief is so great that I am willing that he should use my name in any manner whatsoever to promote his own personal interests or to increase his popularity at my expense. I think my reputation for honor and integrity in the state of Oregon is very good, and I believe that the use of my name will be of a great deal of assistance to further the Governor's political ambition and I feel equally sure that anything Governor West can say about me will not in any way injure me. The intelligent people of Oregon know both of us."

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 13.—Governor West removed Mayor Straw of Marshfield from the Oregon Naval Militia board, on the ground of non-attendance at meetings.

Some time ago the Governor considered holding a court martial to try Mayor Straw, who is lieutenant commander of the naval militia, on the charge of conduct unbecoming an officer for his alleged participation in the Marshfield L. W. W. deportation cases. However, this was not done.

It is understood that Mayor Straw's commission as lieutenant commander likely will be revoked Monday.

STREIFF FOR STREIFF

Socialist Leader Threatens More Disbarment Proceedings.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 13.—"If something isn't done to see that the laws are enforced in Coos County, there is going to be bloodshed," declared Albert Streiff, of Portland, here in the interest of Dr. Bally K. Leach, the Socialist editor who was deported from Bandon. "People are aroused in Coos County and are already arming themselves."

He said that Leach was considering filing affidavits in disbarment proceedings against two more lawyers in that County. He was advised by the Clerk of the Supreme Court to withhold further action in that line until the disbarment case against R. O. Graves, an attorney of Marshfield, is settled.

The Supreme Court received a copy of resolutions passed by the Coos County local of the Socialist party, protesting against the appointment of C. R. Peck as referee to take the testimony in the Graves case. The resolutions say that Peck is a member of the Coos County Bar Association and that the association has passed resolutions of confidence in Graves.

PRODUCTS OF RANCH.

J. D. Benham, of Fairview was in town on Wednesday with a load of watermelons and muskmelons, which found ready market. He expects to realize \$200 from this source this season. Mr. Benham has sold several hundred boxes of selected Gravenstein apples from 75 cents, averaging \$1.50 per box. Recently he shipped 200 boxes to San Francisco, but he has not received returns from them as yet. This has been an off year for tomatoes, according to Mr. Benham. He had 1000 plants and sold every box of tomatoes raised therefrom for 60 cents per box.—Coquille Sentinel.

Extends in a Narrow Strip From Northeast Cape North

FINDS DOCUMENTS OF ILL-FATED EXPEDITION

Commander Wilkitzky of the Russian Navy Responsible for the New Find.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 13.—Confirmation of the discovery of a new land in the Arctic Ocean was received by the Russian Admiralty today in a brief official wireless report from Commander Wilkitzky, of the Russian navy.

The new land extends in a narrow strip from about sixty miles north of Cape Tchelyuskin, also known as Northeast Cape, the northern termination of the Asiatic continent, to eighty-one degrees north.

On Bennett Island Wilkitzky found diaries and documents of the ill-starred expedition of Baron Toll, who was lost in 1900. Expeditions under Baron Nordenskiold, Fridtjof Nansen and Baron Toll passed between Cape Tchelyuskin and the newly-discovered land without noticing its presence.

WANT SURVEY UMPQUA PORT

Port Commission Will Ask U. S. Engineers to Get Busy—Will Seek Federal Aid.

GARDINER, Ore., Oct. 13.—At a meeting of the Umpqua Port Commission here, it was decided to levy a one-half mill tax for the current expenses of the Port for the coming year.

It was also decided to take immediate steps to see that the Umpqua is included in the coming river and harbor bill for an appropriation for a preliminary survey and the adoption of the project for harbor improvement and next year a campaign will be made to get a Federal appropriation for the construction of a jetty.
