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SCHOONER MERCED ON ROCKS; PASSENGERS ESCAPE SAFELY

Left Eureka Yesterday for Columbia River Ports—News Comes by Wireless.

PASSENGERS RETURN TO SAN FRANCISCO

Twenty First and Second Class Passengers Taken Off by Lumber Carrier Atlas.

The wooden schooner Merced is ashore on the rocks off Point Gorda, and her passengers are being taken back to San Francisco on the lumber carrier Atlas, which left Astoria yesterday.

News of the wreck came in meager wireless messages from the Merced, which left Eureka in ballast yesterday for Columbia River ports. She had on board ten first-class passengers and ten second class.

BAND MEETS OIL TANK STEAMER

Vessel Which Assisted Volturino Rescue Receives Tremendous Ovation in London.

The oil tank steamer Narragansett, which was one of the vessels that went to the assistance of the ill-fated Volturino and did signal service by scattering tons of oil on the raging seas, which aided greatly in the rescue work, received a great reception on her arrival in the Thames today.

BAD WEATHER FOR SHIPPING

Three Vessels in Umpqua and Three in Siuslaw Unable to Get Out With Cargoes.

Ed Moeller, lumber inspector who returned today from a trip to Florence, reports that the mills on the Umpqua and Siuslaw are closed down. They are having trouble with their shipping owing to the bad weather.

Three vessels, loaded, were lying at Gardiner awaiting an opportunity to get out and three loaded vessels were also lying at Florence awaiting an opportunity to get out.

At Gardiner, extensive improvements are being made in the plant while it is closed down. At Florence, Porter Brothers have closed their mill but are operating the manufacturing plant, cutting up several hundred thousand feet of dimension stuff.

A. P. Davis, formerly of Marshfield, is now located at Florence and Mr. Moeller says he has just completed a home of his own, having built a small house near town.

OFFICE IS SEARCHED.

Agent Canadian Pacific Charged With Aiding Austrians to Evade Service.

VIENNA, Oct. 16.—Samuel Altman, agent for the Canadian Pacific Railroad here, was arrested today and his office was searched, supposedly in connection with a charge made against him by the company's agent at Lomborg, of assisting Austrians to evade military service by emigrating to Canada without proper passports. Three employees of the road in Galicia were also arrested.

FIERGE STORM ON EAST COAST

GOV. WEST FIRES DR. STRAW AGAIN FROM MILITIA OFFICE

Executive Revokes His Commission as Lieutenant Commander of Oregon Naval Militia Today.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 16.—Governor West revoked the commission of Lieutenant Commander E. E. Straw of the Oregon Naval Militia, who is Mayor of Marshfield, today. He based his action on the alleged activities of Dr. Straw in the deportation of the Industrial Workers of the World from Coos County during the labor trouble last summer. Last week Governor West removed the same officer from the Naval Board.

THREE MISSING AFTER BIG FIRE

Cottage Hotel and Residence Destroyed Near Walla Walla—Hairbreadth Escapes.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 16.—Three men are reported missing, and R. F. Jackson badly injured as a result of a fire at Prescott, north of here today. The Cottage Hotel and a residence were destroyed. Jackson lowered his wife from a third-story window with a rope, after wrapping her in a blanket. Then he descended, but swung through a plate glass window and his leg was nearly amputated.

SALOON KEEPER KILLED BY AUTO

Seattle Man Run Down by Nephew of Duke of "Duke's Mixture" Fame.

SEATTLE, Oct. 16.—Lawrence Duke, thirty-five, a nephew of James B. Duke, president of the American Tobacco company, spent the night in the county jail after his auto struck and killed Henry Farr, a saloon keeper, and seriously injured Alfred Hoglund, an expressman, and Thomas Simmons, a clerk, on the county road south of Seattle.

The three victims were replacing a tire on Hoglund's machine when Duke's car rounded the turn. It is believed Hoglund's skull is fractured. Simmons' arm and several ribs were broken and he sustained internal injuries.

Duke was arrested December 28 last, charged with driving an auto while drunk.

RECOVER BODY FROM THE BAY

Hindu Accused of Murder in San Francisco Confesses He Killed Waitress.

CALEXICO, Cal., Oct. 16.—Said All Khan, a Hindu, accused of having murdered Rosa Domingo, whose body, loaded with chains, was recovered from San Francisco Bay near Stege, was captured here by Sheriff Mobley Meadows, who said the prisoner confessed.

The Domingo girl was a waitress. After her body was taken from the bay bits of her clothing were found in the ashes in the fireplace of the shack from which the Hindu vanished.

NEWS TO STRAW

Gov. West's Latest Personal Attack on Mayor of Marshfield.

The above comes as news here, although not unexpected. It is possible that he has the power to revoke Mayor Straw's commission as Lieutenant Commander of the Naval Militia, but it is doubted by many that he had the authority to oust Straw from the Naval Board, the law providing for the latter not giving the Governor that authority.

Mayor Straw accepted the election as Lieutenant Commander of the Naval Militia at the time that Gov. West was having troubles of his own with the Naval Militia, and Straw's acceptance of the place was largely to aid West.

KEEP TAMMANY FROM CONTROL

Progressives and Republicans to Unite to Keep Aldermen From Machine Control.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Leaders of the Progressive and republican parties in this city have agreed to unite in an effort to prevent Tammany from securing control of the next board of aldermen. In districts where progressive candidates are running against republican nominees for alderman, with the exception of two or three, the progressive candidates will be withdrawn. In consideration of this move the republican organization will withdraw assembly candidates in the districts affected and support the progressives.

PORTLAND BOYS UNDER ARREST

Police Believe Three Youths Responsible for Series of Systematic Robberies.

PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 16.—George Yank, Harry Johnson, Charles Burgess, all young men, are under arrest here. The police believe them responsible for a systematic series of robberies in fourteen leading hotels in this and other Northwest cities.

SUFFRAGETTE IS SENTENCED

Young Woman Must Serve Eighteen Months for Setting Fire to House.

CAMBRIDGE, Oct. 16.—Miss Miriam Pratt, a militant suffragette, school teacher at Norwich, was sentenced to eighteen months penal servitude for setting fire to a house. The fire damaged the university laboratory.

RALPH ROSE DEAD.

Famous California Athlete Succumbs to Typhoid Fever.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—Ralph Rose, holder of the Olympic and world's records for shot putting, died today of typhoid fever, following a brief illness.

FRANCE RECEIVES REQUEST TO SEND A WARSHIP TO MEXICO

LAUNCH NOVEL BATTLESHIP

Details of Construction of New British Ship Kept Secret—Immense Armament.

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Oct. 16.—Another novelty in battleships, the Queen Elizabeth, which carries an immense armament, was launched at the Royal navy dock yards today. The details of construction have been kept secret, but the armament is believed generally to consist of ten 15-inch guns mounted in pairs, while the secondary armament of four or six inch guns will also be placed behind protected armor.

SULZER FOUND GUILTY TODAY

FOUND GUILTY BY A VOTE OF 39 TO 18.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 16.—Governor Sulzer was found guilty of Article 1, falsifying his campaign statements, by a vote of thirty-nine to eighteen.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 16.—

The high court of impeachment, trying Governor William Sulzer, adjourned shortly after one o'clock today to meet at three this afternoon, at which time it was announced, a start would be made on the final vote to determine the guilt or innocence of the Governor. It was reported the court voted informally in secret session to remove the Governor from office, by a ballot of forty-three to fourteen. A vote to disqualify him from ever holding another office was also reported to have been taken, but was lost.

The Judges and Senators filed into the Senate chamber six minutes after three o'clock. The galleries and corridors were thronged. A roll call showed all fifty-seven members of the court present. Sulzer was not present, but was represented by attorneys. At three fourteen presiding Judge Cullen directed the clerk to read the first of the eight articles of impeachment against the Governor.

CHILD BADLY HURT BY FALL

YOUNG SON OF MR. AND MRS. E. L. CHURCH OF CATCHING INLET ALMOST DISEMBOWELED BY ACCIDENT TODAY.

The three or four year old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Church of Catching Inlet, while playing around the home today stumbled and fell. He either struck on a knife with which he was playing or on a soap stone. A gash was cut in his stomach, penetrating the abdomen wall and almost disemboweling him. He was taken to Mercy Hospital this afternoon for a more minute examination and treatment.

FIGURING NEW TARIFF EFFECT.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 16.—The actual effect of the new tariff law on the government's revenue will be disclosed by a detailed comparison now being made for Secretary McAdoo. The estimate of expenses of all branches of the government is now almost finished.

French Colony Asks Home Government to Send Vessel—Result Uncertain.

TAKE REFUGEES ON VESSEL FROM TORREON

Member of Late Madero's Cabinet Flees From Mexico in Disguise.

PARIS, Oct. 16.—The French Foreign Office today received a telegram from the French legation at Mexico City, suggesting that a warship be sent to Mexico.

Government officials are considering the matter and it is probable, following the usual practice of sending warships, the French colony requested one to be detailed to Mexico. The French Foreign Office has not been advised whether the diplomatic corps in Mexico City counseled the Mexican government to use caution in replying to the American representative.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 16.—

The Mexican situation remained unchanged today and the administration officials are agreed generally in the view that the Huerta government would make no answer to President Wilson's latest note.

The news of the latest constitutional victory was received without comment. The situation of the Washington government is still a waiting one, with the United States in the attitude of a close observer.

MANUEL BONILLA, WHO WAS MINISTER OF COMMUNICATIONS IN THE LATE PRESIDENT MADERO'S CABINET, SAILED FROM HERE TODAY ON THE HAMBURG-AMERICAN LINER KRONPRINZIN CECILE IN DISGUISE, FEARED ARREST, AND FLED FROM MEXICO.

The vessel will sail to Cuba, Spain, England and Germany. Arrangements were made for 200 refugees from Torreon to be taken on board the Texas City at Tampico. American Consul William Canada and Rear Admiral Fletcher supervised the arrangements. The Texas City left today.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT WAITS

Will Take No Action in Mexican Affair at Present.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The British government has adopted a waiting attitude in regard to the Mexican situation. It considers the matter thus far as entirely an internal affair of Mexico, and does not contemplate any action. The British Foreign Office has received no information from the legation in Mexico City in respect to a report of the conference of diplomatic corps.

FORMER AMBASSADOR SAYS

LOOKS LIKE INTERVENTION

SPOKANE, Oct. 16.—"The developments of the day look like intervention," declared Henry Lane Wilson, former ambassador to Mexico, who arrived yesterday. "It cannot be a question of withdrawing recognition of the present Mexican administration by any government. Once it has been accorded, recognition of a government cannot be withdrawn, according to well-established precedents. The election October 25 will be just as free as any other Mexican election, but it will be well to understand that no free election ever has been held in Mexico."

Wilson said there was no special significance to the meeting of the diplomatic corps called by the Spanish Minister.

CONFERS WITH SENATORS.

President Wilson Talks on Currency Legislation With Committee.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 16.—President Wilson sent today for Senators Hitchcock, Reed and O'Gorman, the Democratic Senate banking committee men who had been regarded as opposed to the administration program of currency legislation. The President saw them separately and conferred at length.

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
