**THE LATEST** dance to create a furor in Newport is called the "Lame Duck." It was first introduced to Newport by Miss Marguerite Caperton, daughter of Rear Admiral William B. Caperton, U. S. N., and Mrs. Caperton, says an exchange. She is one of the most popular dancers of the season and a partner frequently sought by the Grand Duke Alexander Michailovitch during his recent visit here.

"The 'Lame Duck' originated in Boston," said Miss Caperton to a reporter. "Please don't say that I invented it, for really I got the idea from Boston, where I think it was first thought out by some Harvard student."

"But you were the first to dance it with a partner, were you not?"

"Well, perhaps I was."

"And you have perfected the steps and brought the dance to Newport?"

Miss Caperton was asked:

"Yes, I was the first to dance it here, but every one in the younger set can dance it now, you know, and it is destined, I believe, to become the most popular dance in New York this winter, for many of my friends who have learned it in Newport will continue to dance it in New York. I do wish you would call it the 'Valse Carter.' It was originally meant to be called by that name, you know, but while we were all learning it the effort to keep one leg stiff while the foot of the other was being continually put forward produced a limp, which was positively funny, and we termed it then and there the 'Lame Duck.'"

"It really is a very graceful dance, and it is only when it is being learned that the limping effect is prevalent, for after one becomes perfectly familiar with the steps there is a gliding motion which I might say is far from the movements of a lame duck."

The dance is similar in a way to the one-step, but is danced to waltz time and the music is played rather slowly. One foot precedes the other; that is, the first foot is advanced with the step motion, and the other foot is brought up with the leg somewhat stiffened, making a slight hitch, with a little hesitation. This feature is made too marked by the beginners thereby robbing it of some of the intended grace. Although the steps are not intricate, the time is very hard at first, for with the slow waltz step tempo one must glide in a sort of double time, that is to say count one-two, and as this brings the last step into a beat of longer duration than the first, it produces the "limp," or hesitation effect. Like all the dances of the modern period, the man may vary slightly the conventional step and his partner is supposed to read his intention instantly. The dance is very restful and very light to those who have mastered its possibilities, but was once to the beginner who practices it too long.
