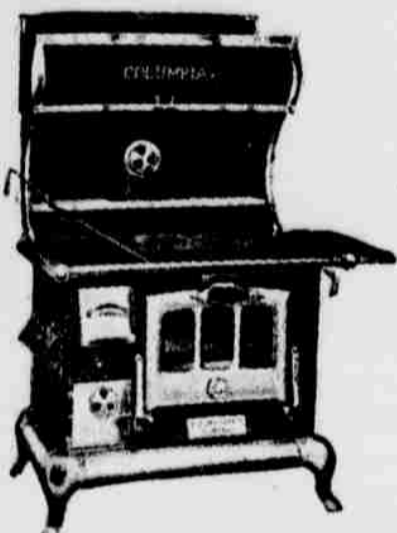

Furniture for Annex.—A carload of furniture, mostly Circassian walnut bed room suites and Wilton velvet carpets, arrived on the Breakwater for the Chandler Annex. It came through Golang & Harvey.

Plays Football.—Bigbee, who played third base for the Marshfield team this season is playing quarterback on the Oregon University football team this fall. Bigbee expects to break into big league baseball next season.

Homestead Contest.—The Homestead contest of Frank Shaler against Miss Grace Fulton, involving a North Inlet claim, will be heard before Arthur Peck Monday. Gus Lovegren of Portland, United States Inspector, is here in connection with the matter.

Dr. Cooley Speaks.—Dr. J. E. Cooley, lately of Salem, will preach at the Presbyterian Church next Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock. Rev. J. E. Burkhart, the pastor is absent on attendance at the synod at Portland. There will be no morning service.

For New Vessel.—Capt. A. M. Simpson, L. J. Simpson and C. S. Winsor of North Bend were in Marshfield yesterday to confer with J. Homer Fritch about his proposed fast steamship. Mr. Fritch expects to set about \$250,000 in stock, part of which is to be placed on the Bay. He has not closed his deal yet.

Fine Visit.—Dal Cathcart says that during his trip to Roseburg this week he had a fine visit with many old friends. One of them was Mr. F. Denning, father of Frank Denning of Marshfield, for whom Cathcart worked fifty years ago. Mr. Denning celebrated his eighty-seventh birthday two days before Mr. Cathcart got there. Mr. Cathcart says that Roseburg is prosperous, having eleven miles of paved streets now. He says that although Roseburg is dry, Sutherland, fifteen miles away, is an oasis, and the Southern Pacific trains run so that you can leave Roseburg at 8 o'clock and return at 9:30 with a suitcase full of

liquid refreshments. He says that the traffic has been so heavy that the Southern Pacific sells round trip tickets at excursion rates and in consequence Roseburg is not so dry as some claim.
