Yesterday while visiting her daughter, Mrs. John Peterson, the deceased complained of a slight pain in her head. On her way home she fell unconscious at the home of Nels Peterson. Mr. Peterson cared for her, but she rapidly declined and passed away at 6:30 p. m., without regaining consciousness. LYONS BACK TO LUMBER GAME

Former Coos Bay Man Superintendent of Big Plant at Cosmopolis, Wash.

The following from the Hoquiam Washingtonian will be of interest to the many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. E. Lyons on Coos Bay: "James E. Lyons, or 'Jimmie' Lyons as he is known to the old-timers of Hoquiam, has been appointed superintendent of the big plant of the Grays Harbor Commercial company at Cosmopolis, Manager Cooney making the announcement yesterday. Mr. Lyons has assumed the duties of his new position and his family will remove to Cosmopolis the first of November, occupying the residence of Mr. L. B. Nims, father of Mrs. Lyons. Mr. and Mrs. Nims having left on an extended trip East Tuesday.

"Jim Lyons came to Hoquiam when a lad of fifteen and has been a resident ever since with the exception of short periods spent in California and Oregon. He has been a millman most of his life, having been engaged with the North Western, Simpson company at Coos Bay, the North Pacific at Portland and, in the early days, with the present company to which he is returning. For the past few years Jim has been engaged in the laundry business in Hoquiam as the proprietor of the White Steam Laundry. He is now getting back to the lumber business, his first love, and his many friends wish the largest measure of success."

SHERM. GAMBLE PASSES AWAY

Well Known Young Business Man of North Bend Dies in California.

A telegram was received yesterday at North Bend announcing the sudden death of Sherman Gamble at the sanitarium at Belmont, Calif., where he went a few weeks ago for treatment for tuberculosis. Word was received Saturday that he was in a critical condition. Mrs. Gamble left about a week ago to be with him and she had evidently reached there but a short time previous to the end.

Mr. Gamble was for years connected with the Gamble Meat markets in North Bend and Marshfield as buyer. He was well liked by all who knew him. His death makes the fifth death in the family in about five years, three brothers and sisters and their father dying in that time.

Mrs. Gamble sent the news of his death and wired that the body had been shipped on the Redondo and that she would come overland. She asked that funeral arrangements be delayed until she arrives.
