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WOULD CHECK LOT SCHEME

North Bend Chamber of Commerce Hears Arraignment of J. Kreis' Project.

At a meeting of the North Bend Chamber of Commerce, held last evening, N. McLeod, of the firm of McLeod-McKay & Co., bitterly arraigned the promoters of a Coos Bay townsite company, and Mr. Kreis in particular, one of the prime movers of the scheme near Cooston. In his remarks he declared that an enterprise of the nature of this affair should not go unchecked and moved that the body adopt resolutions condemning the methods of the company. No action was taken by the body, however. Messrs. Malloy, Hollister and Warren were appointed as a committee of three to take up the matter of the neglect of the company to keep

people supplied with water during the street repairs. Several residents of North Bend having been without water service for the past three weeks.

The matter of the New Yeast factory at North Bend was taken up by a committee of five appointed to investigate the affairs of the new company with a view towards rendering material assistance. The committee as appointed is Messrs. Robertson, Graves, Loggie, Robertson, N. C. McLeod and Hazer. The question of a free market where the farmers could find a direct buyer for their goods and avoid the middleman, was brought up, but not definite action was taken.

THREE FIRES REPORTED IN WRECKED MINE
