NO TRULY, we haven't time to
quarrel. There is so much that
is worth doing in the business
of publishing a newspaper, so much
in which the public is interested,
that there is neither leisure nor in-
clination to quarrel.

GOSSIPING IN WISCONSIN.

THE women of Wisconsin are the
victims of what appears to be a
gross imposition. "Man-made"
law has taken from them their go-
ssiping privilege—as old as the sex
itself—but makes no adequate return
in the form of the ballot. They may
neither vote their public convictions
nor voice their private ones. They
are prohibited from running for of-
fice and running down their neigh-
bors, which leaves life a dreary waste
indeed. Revolutions have been fought
for a lesser cause.

A few days ago the first convic-
tion was obtained under the anti-gos-
sip law, a woman being fined \$21.80
for a violation which she cheerfully
confessed. We have not heard the
choice bit that made her break the
law, but from the manner in which
the defendant comforted herself at
her trial, she seems to regard it as
worth the money. There are times
when almost everyone would give
\$21.80 for the pleasure of full and
free expression of the same kind.

But it is safe to say that the Wis-
consin women will not rest content
with paying fines for the enjoyment
of a privilege not withheld from
their enfranchised brothers. In polit-
ics gossiping is not gossip, but discus-
sion. It becomes legal. This infamously
unfair and unnatural law will
aid in hastening the day of equal
suffrage in the Beaver state and when
that time comes, as in California,
the women will be presumed to be
too busy to indulge in malicious
tale-bearing.

CONCRETE AND GRAVEL ROADS.

A PROMINENT good-roads advo-
cate belonging to the American
Automobile Association, says:
"It is a waste of time to build roads
of anything better than gravel and
not so good as concrete." By which
he means that if the road is to be
anything less than absolutely perma-
nent, it should be of gravel or plain
earth. One thing is sure, the auto-
mobiles are putting macadam roads
in the category of things which will
not do. Concrete roads built over
twenty years ago have been kept in
repair under country-town conditions
at an annual expense rate of fifteen
dollars a mile, and are still better
than any macadam road is likely to
be in one tenth the time in this age
of rubber-tired vehicles. The ideal
road would seem to be a narrow
concrete roadway with earth or gravel
ways at the sides. The motorists
will follow the concrete, and in or-
dinary going the drivers who consid-
er their horses' feet will keep on the
pleasant and softer track at the sides.
In bad weather all could use
the narrow concrete way. The earth
or gravel road should run alongside
every macadam, brick or concrete
way. It keeps teams off the motor
path and makes pleasant riding for
both horse and horseman. The time
will come when permanence in our
roads will be more highly appreciat-
ed and worked for more generally.

GRAIN CROP
IS BIG ONE

ALBERT SCHROEDER HAD OVER
75 BUSHELS PER ACRE ON
TRACT NEAR MYRTLE POINT—

There were 6990 bushels of grain
raised this year by Albert Schroeder

averaged nearly seventy-five bushels
to the acre. Twenty of the eighty-
one acres in grain averaged ninety
bushels to the acre.

NEWS OF NORTH BEND

STEVENS HELD
TO GRAND JURY

North Bend Cigar Man Bound
Over by Justice Shuster
Today on Charge.

After a brief preliminary hearing
before Justice Shuster in North
Bend today, J. E. Stevens, known as
Derby Stevens, was bound over to
the grand jury on charges of un-
lawful relations with Myrtle Lenet,
of Ferndale, the charges against
him being made by Miss Dodson.

His bail was reduced from \$3000
to \$2500 and N. C. McLeod, his at-
torney, stated that this would be
furnished before evening. Mr. Mc-
Leod said there was nothing to the
charges.

Bail is \$3000.

The case of "Derby" Stevens, the
North Bend cigarmaker, came up for
preliminary hearing in Judge Shus-
ter's court at North Bend. The com-
plaint charges that Miss Myrtle Lenet
of Ferndale and Stevens are guilty
of lewd cohabitation. M. McLeod,
attorney for the defendant, moved
that the court fix bail for Stevens,
arguing that the amount be reason-
able and the court then set bail at
\$3000. Miss Lenet was released on
her own recognizance, subject to the
order of the court. The complaint
was filed by Helen Dodson, who has
been employed at Stevens' cigar fac-
tory in Flat B, acting as private pros-
ecutor. It is believed that the com-
plaint grew out of a quarrel existing
between Stevens and the Dodson girl.

Later in the afternoon another
complaint was signed by Helen Dod-
son charging Stevens with a statu-
tory offense on the person of Miss
Myrtle Lenet.

Upon her admission to bail Miss
Lenet stated that the complaint was
one that grew out of jealousy and
that she had never been wronged by
Stevens. She displayed a diamond
ring and says that she and Stevens
are engaged to be married.
