There is still talk of other candidates, principally C. R. Peck and F. E. Allen. C. C. Going was also talked of today.

Carl Evertsen and Duncan Ferguson are said to be the only two certain candidates for Councilmen known so far.

CITY WORK TO
TOTAL \$200,000

During the current year Marshfield will expend considerably over \$150,000 in municipal improvements, such as new streets and sewers. Counting in the work to be done here by the dredge Seattle, the total would probably exceed \$200,000 in round figures.

City Engineer Buckingham has been kept very busy with the work but has kept it pretty well distributed so that he has been able to handle it at a minimum cost for engineering, etc. Usually five per cent is allowed in estimates for engineering expenses, which make the total for this year between \$7500 and \$10,000, but it will not be more than half that amount.

The following is a list of the improvements with the estimated costs in round figures of the street and sewer work, a few being included which may not be completed this year, but which have been ordered, and the plans and specifications for them provided:
