Krueger was unable to furnish bail and was remanded to the Coos county jail. The case was prosecuted by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist. Krueger was formerly in Marshfield and worked around the saloons and was also employed on a ranch at Sumner for a time.

CHAS. WARRINER IS AGAIN FREE

SERVED FOUR YEARS FOR EMBEZZLEMENT OF \$643,000
FROM THE BIG FOUR RAILROAD.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Oct. 31.—After serving four years, Charles Warriner, former treasurer of the Big Four Railroad Company, was released yesterday from the penitentiary. He went to Cincinnati, where he proposes to resume his residence temporarily. He was sentenced from Cincinnati in 1910 to six years for embezzlement of \$643,000 of the Big Four's funds. He confessed the shortage was effected through the manipulation of the books covering several years. His term was shortened by good behaviour.
