LUMBER AND PANAMA CANAL.

HE TIMES prints an interesting Mr. C. A. Smith in another column. His views of the highly probable beneficial effect of the opening of the Panama Canal on the lumber trade, are a result of careful consideration. Such a result means much for Coos Bay. That this section has suffered no deleterious effects from the continued duliness of the lumber trade for the past four years may be attributed largely to the highly efficient organization of the C. A. Smith Company and the modern methods and equipment of the Smith mill. While many mills in other sections were closing or operating only a portion of the time, the Smith mill has continued regularly and much of the time CARLTON F.
