New Pipe Organ.—The new pipe organ which Manager Lemanski has had installed in the Royal will be used for the first time next Saturday night.

Big Payment.—Recorder Butler has received a check from the Southern Pacific for \$16,521.38 in payment of their street improvement assessments in Marshfield.

Get Gravel.—About twenty-five carloads of gravel were brought in yesterday from the Myrtle Point gravel pits for use in the hard paving operations in Marshfield.

Takes Lumber.—The A. M. Simpson took on 310,000 feet of lumber for the Coquille mill and a shipment of lath at the C. A. Smith mill, all for the Dollar Lumber Company.

Brought Rails.—The Tillamook unloaded a carload of rails here for the Southern Pacific. Archie Phillips stated that the grading in North Bend would soon be done and ready for the steel work.

Fog Bothers.—On account of a heavy fog the Pronto was stalled on a mud bank on Coos River for the night. Several of the smaller crafts including the mail boats have been stalled recently on account of the heavy fogs.

Bowling Tournament.—The Preferred Stock and Good Candy teams, the leaders and tall enders in the bowling tournament now on will meet in the Chatterton bowling alleys tonight in an interesting series of three games.

Apples Pay Well.—A. E. Seaman reports that this is the first season that he has got good money out of his apples. He sold his entire output of Baldwins for about \$1 per box and expects to get about \$1.25 for the more select fruit.

New Fixup Store.—Work has been commenced in remodeling the old postoffice building, which is to be transferred into a modern store building with a new modern front, for the Fixup clothing store which

will move into it in about two weeks.

Buy Residence.—Yesterday Geo. W. Campbell bought through the Coos Bay Realty Co. the new bungalow belonging to O. L. Clark, paying \$1750 cash. Mr. Campbell bought as an investment and will rent the property.

Many Passengers.—Capt. Alec Hall, of the Ferry Transit, states that last Saturday marked the end of the fifth year of the service and during that time he has carried 329,373 passengers, in addition to the large number of teams, automobiles and livestock.

Bandon Street Case.—G. T. Treadgold came over from Bandon yesterday to make application for a temporary injunction in the case of Archie R. Rosa vs. the City of Bandon. Mayor Mast and other city officials restraining them from executing an assessment for the improvement of Oregon street.

Meet Tonight.—There will be a meeting of the congregation of the Episcopal Church this evening at 7:30 at the church. As important matters are to be discussed all are earnestly urged to be present. The Vestry Board will meet immediately after the meeting of the congregation adjourns.

Buy Billiard Parlor.—Messrs. E. H. Fletcher and G. C. Schroeder, who recently arrived from Twin Falls, Idaho, have purchased Matt's billiard parlors on Alfred Mattson, Jr. and will take possession at once. They will rename it "The Liberal." Mr. Mattson has not decided just what he will do.

To Coquille.—Mr. Hooper, the Bandon man who was taken up here the other day for insanity, will be taken to Coquille tomorrow by Constable Cox for examination. Hooper came from California. At times, he is sane and then knows of his mental trouble. He is about forty years old.

Hard Dredging.—The dredge Seattle has encountered a hard streak of clay in Isthmus Inlet above the Smith mill and the dredging is slow, the clay coming out in big chunks. There is also a lot of fine sand that is hard pumping. It is not expected that this will last long so that it will make any material delay.

Big Salmon Run.—Capt. Ned Galloway reports a big run of silver-sides in Ten Mile Creek. Yesterday about 6000 fish were taken by the two outfits fishing there, one being known as the Ingersoll outfit and the other as the Clinton outfit. About 1500 fish were brought in today and the rest stored there. The run may be a record breaker this year.

Library Grows.—The circulation of the Marshfield Public Library has shown a marked increase for the month of October of this year over the corresponding month last year. The increase being in excess of 500, making a total of 1700 circulation for the month of October. The Librarian, Miss Elizabeth Topping, states that most of the books withdrawn are best sellers, the Bible and other religious books being seldom taken from the library, being used only for reference.

New Building.—W. A. Reid is in receipt of a communication from J. O. Bristol authorizing him to have plans and specifications drawn for a brick building on the property adjoining the Svea Bar on Front street. The property was recently purchased by Mr. Bristol and it is presumed that the erection of the building will commence as soon as the plans have been approved. It is likely that a one story building will be erected now, but a second story may be added later. Mr. Bristol is a member of the Eugene Police force.
