MOBERLY, Mo., Nov. 6.—A patient undergoing a dental operation at the annual convention of the North Central Missouri Dental Association here recently, went crazy and attacked and stampeded the delegates.
Tearing the gas machine loose from the fixtures, he hurled it through a window and it landed in an automobile occupied by two women. Neither was injured. A basketful of forceps and a chair followed the gas machine through the window. Two dentists were knocked down and several were slightly injured in the rush for the stairs.

FOREST NOTES.
There are about 37 pines native to the United States, of which 25 are Western species, and 12 Eastern.
Paraguay has valuable forest resources, the most important of which is quebracho, particularly rich in tannin.
Much of the cork used throughout the world comes from Portugal, which harvests about 50,000 tons a year.
Germany is said to have an over-supply of foresters, so that well-educated men have hard work to secure even inferior positions.
One of the largest forest nurseries in the United States is conducted by the forest service near Haugen, Montana. It is known as the Savenac Nursery, and has a capacity of 4,000,000 young trees a year.
The forests of Norway are mostly in private or municipal ownership, the nation owning 28.5 per cent of the total forest area. The national forests of the United States occupy only about twenty per cent of the total forest area of the country.

PROXY MARRIAGE VALID.
Ceremony Performed at Home of the Bride's Parents in Holland.
WALNUT GROVE, Cal., Nov. 6.—Married by proxy to his sweetheart while she was at the home of her parents in Holland and he was at work on a ranch near here, P. Advokaat and his bride have arrived at Walnut Grove to begin their married life. Advokaat met his wife on her arrival in New York.
The bride's brother took the place of Advokaat at the marriage ceremony. This method is legal in Holland and it is held that a properly attested marriage certificate, issued by Holland authorities, establishes the validity of the marriage in this country.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Nov. 6.—Chris Evans, criminal partner of Bandit Sontag in a series of train hold-ups and murders that terrorized California 20 years ago, and now a paroled prisoner from California prisons, has applied to California authorities for permission to accept a position as city watchman in Portland, Or.
The man who was an outlaw for a year in the mountains of Fresno and Tulare counties 20 years ago, after having robbed trains and slain several officers, feels that he is specially fitted for guardianship of the peace and order. Evans is at present living with his family at Portland.

WESTERN UNIVERSITY HAS A REMARKABLE GROWTH
The University of California, at which a large number of local young people are registered this year, has made just this summer a remarkable stride forward in attendance. It is now second largest in the United States and eighth largest in the world.
The total enrollment this year in the degree-giving departments will approximate 6000 and if the students in the 1913 summer school be added to this the year's enrollment will reach about 8500. The rate of increase this year is something like 13 per cent. The freshman class alone this year numbers nearly 1500 students—more than the entire student body in 1899; the number of new students alone this year will at least equal the enrollment of either Johns Hopkins, Princeton or Stanford Universities.
