Reigard has had the matter up with the Oregon members of Congress and other officials and has been informed that on application from the commercial

bodies, the granting of the right to use the reserve for park purposes would be recommended if the cities here would pay the expense of a survey. North Bend will cooperate.

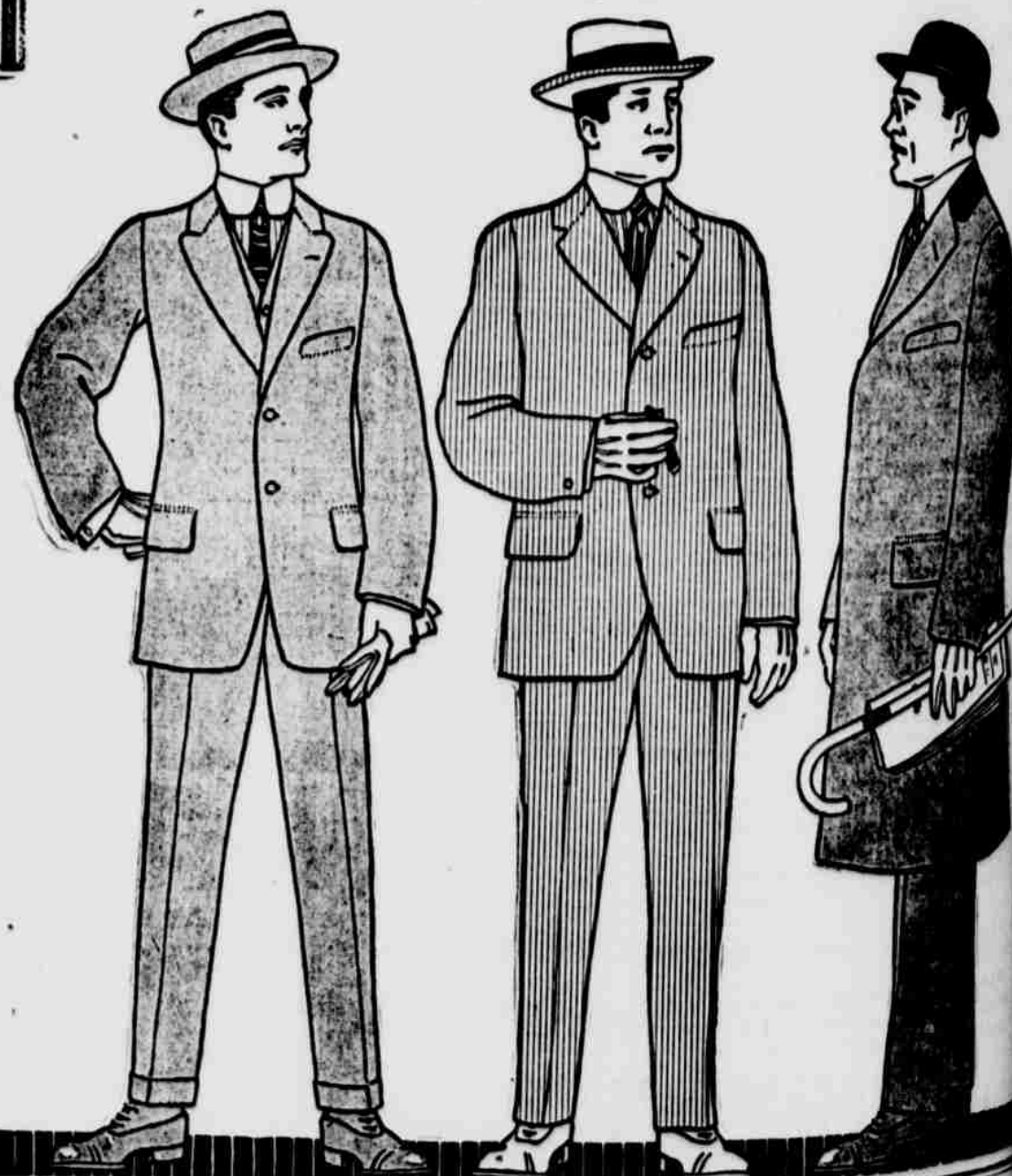
