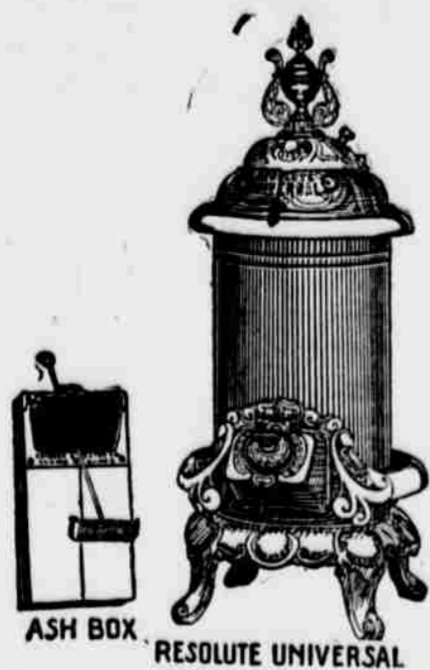

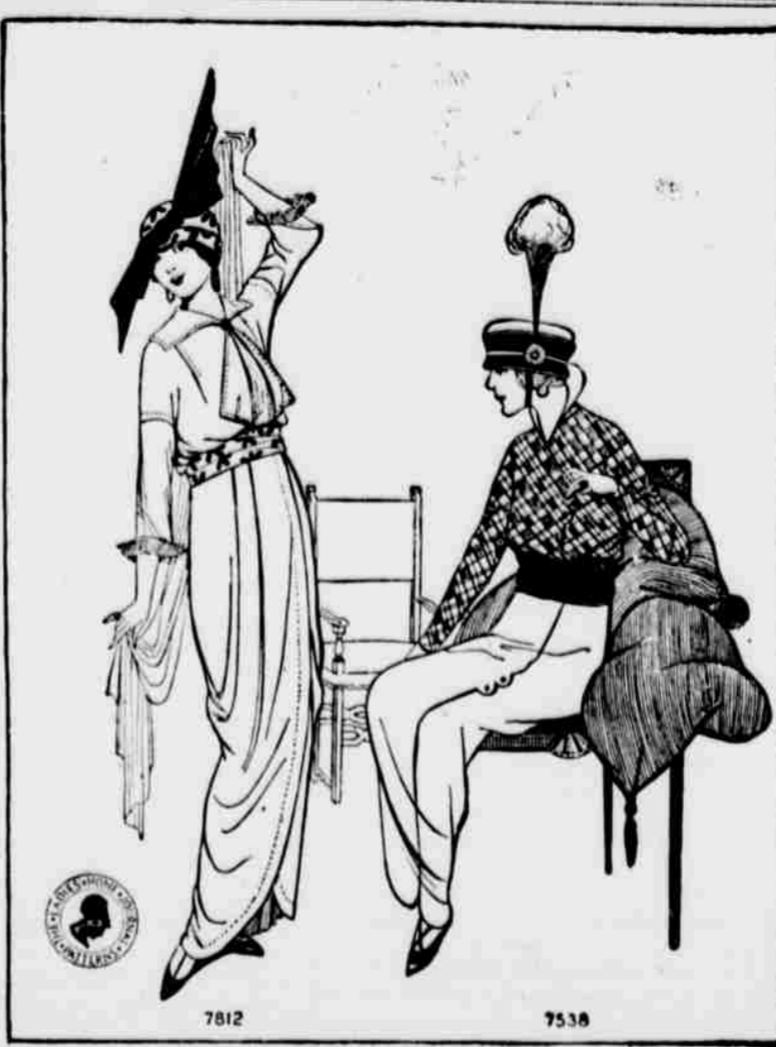

**COOS COUNTY PIONEERS**

One of the best known pioneers of Coos and Curry Counties was A. H. Thrift, now of San Jose, California. A resident of Coos County, while taking a trip through California, called on Mr. Thrift at his home in San Jose, and jotted down a few notes regarding the old pioneer and his connection with the early settlement of this section.  
Mr. Thrift, when a lad of 13, left his home in Knox County, Ohio, and crossed the plains with a company bound for Oregon. They arrived at Portland on September 8, 1852. He remained at Portland a month and then went to Jacksonville, where he remained until May, 1853, when he joined the Perry B. Marple Company and started for Coos Bay. They came in by way of Camas Valley and the Middle Fork of the Coquille River.

When Marple organized the company, the following persons were included: Perry B. Marple, R. S. Belknap, W. H. Harris, Bill Jackson, A. P. DeCuis, Dr. Foster, F. G. Lockhart, Dr. Shields, Dr. Coffin, Capt. Stark, Frank Ross, Sol Bowermaster, Dr. Overbeck, Charles Pierce, Charles Haskell and a few more whose names Mr. Thrift has forgotten.

Chas. Haskell was the first Sheriff of Coos County. Billy Romance was the first County Clerk. The first families to arrive on Coos Bay were F. G. Lockhart's, Dr. Overbeck's and Judge Tolman's. Curtis Noble and family arrived a few days later.

Alex Thrift, which was the name Mr. Thrift was generally known by, went to the Randolph mines, on the beach north of where Bandon now is, in the fall of 1853, and remained there until 1858. He then went to the Sixes mines in Curry County, staying there until 1862, when he went to the Salmon River mines in Idaho. After a year in Idaho he

**BOY HUSBAND AND GIRL WIFE DRAFT CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS—RULES GIVEN FOR GOVERNING HOUSEHOLD.**

His wife will get the breakfast and attend to the dishes.

Before leaving for work the husband will kiss his wife goodbye.

If possible he will return for lunch, but if this cannot be arranged, Mrs. Maddock will put it up for him.

In the evening Maddock will help his wife with the dishes.

When possible the young couple will attend a theater or moving picture show together.

If this cannot be done, they will take turns reading aloud.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 13.—Mr. and Mrs. Earle Maddock, the youngest bride and groom in California, have begun housekeeping in a three-room apartment at 516 North Bunker Hill avenue. This couple, aged 16 and 14, respectively, started housekeeping after they had carefully drawn up a detailed plan concerning their domestic relations.

The young couple have been married thirty days, but it was not until recently that they arranged to conduct their own housekeeping affairs in an apartment, which they share with Mrs. Maddock's mother and father. The child wife and her boy husband had been debating their scheme, which they think will assure them happiness.

"We have talked it all over and mapped it all out," said Mrs. Maddock. "We will be very happy; we are very happy now."

"Earle will help me with some of the work. In the evening he will help 'do the dishes.' I will keep busy while he is away; I will do our washing and ironing, and I hope to make most of my clothes. Although I am only 14, I know how to cook and how to sew. I believe in working and surely if people can be happy working it is a good thing."

"We have had no quarrel since we were married. Earle doesn't know how to button my waist yet, but there are a great many older men who don't know how to do that very well."

While Mrs. Maddock was defining her views upon married life, her young husband was listening. "Yes, what she says is true," he commented. "I am working with my father-in-law, Harry Kennard, and I believe that a husband should turn his wages over to his wife. I do not make a big salary, but all I get I give to my wife. She pays the bills for the household. I believe that it is a good plan because a woman learns then the meaning of a dollar."

"We expect to move out of this apartment as soon as possible. We want to get into our own home. In addition, I want to go back into the drug business. I believe it is better than what I am doing now."

Maddock and his wife were married by Justice of the Peace Forbes and a short time later they were taken into the juvenile court by Captain Garfield Gillis and Humane Officer McLaughlin. When all of the facts were explained to Judge Taft he dismissed the complaint against the couple and announced that they were legally married.

returned to Curry County and bought the Ruffner hotel at Port Orford, of which he was proprietor for a few years.

In 1866 he and A. H. Hinch located what was afterwards known as the Lane blacksand mine, on the original beach at Randolph, about three miles inland from the present ocean beach. At that time, Bill Hinch, who was then Deputy Sheriff at Empire City, came to Randolph and arrested Hinch for killing an Indian woman. A special term of Court was called to try the case, and Hinch was acquitted.

Shortly afterwards, Messrs. Thrift and Hinch sold the mine to John Pershbaker and went to Curry County, where he bought the large dairy farm on Floras Creek, which he still owns. After following dairying, stock raising and dealing in merchandise for many years, he retired from business late in the 90's and moved to California. He is now 78 years old, and his wife, who came to Oregon with her parents in 1843, when a child, is aged 74. Their many friends in Coos and Curry will be pleased to learn that they are enjoying good health, considering their advanced age.
