HARD SCRAP ON ROAD ROUTES

MEETING AT NORTH BEND FRIDAY NIGHT—COQUILLE RIVER PEOPLE OPPOSED TO CHANGING ROUTE TO UMPQUA.

The proposal to change the Coos County road to the interior from the Myrtle Point route to the Umpqua route is stirring up much discussion, especially among the upper Coquille Valley residents, who feel that it will be injurious to them. At the same time, the Ten Mile ranchers are jubilant, as they claim that Douglas County is certain to support the Umpqua road against the Myrtle Point road.

The matter will probably be a principal topic of discussion at a meeting to be held in North Bend tomorrow night at which a number of good road boosters from all parts of the county, including President Morrison of the Good Roads Association, are expected to be present.

Coquille View Given.

The Coquille view of the situation is given by the Coquille Herald as follows:

"The Herald is in favor of good roads and is willing to give whatever support is in its power to the bonding proposition. Let no one, therefore, think from what is about to be said that it is 'knocking' the good roads movement. But to the mammoth brain behind this type-writer, it looks as though an irreconcilable deadlock was scheduled to show up right away in the bonding campaign. The announcement that Douglas County will not carry out the plan agreed on and build to the county line on the Middle Fork, but will build down the Umpqua River to its mouth and there connect with a road from Coos Bay, will put an entirely different look on the whole proposition in this part of the county. It is evident that the new plan will suit Coos Bay as well as the old one, but it will not suit the River, and that fact will very soon become apparent. A route from the interior which comes in to Coos Bay through the heart of the Coquille country, and a route which reaches the Bay without touching Coquille territory, are two entirely different propositions. The first would receive the support of the people in this part of the county; the other will not. It is true that if Douglas will not build to the line on the Middle Fork route it would be folly for this county to spend money on a hard surface road to that point. At the same time, it was on that very proposition of the Myrtle Point route that the River people were willing to unite with the people of the Bay, and when that part of the plan is eliminated it will be found that the get-together spirit will not be so vociferously manifested on this side of the divide.

"There is and has been for years a feeling on the Coquille that 'Coos Bay wants to hog it all,' and this feeling often finds expression in words. Whether the feeling is justified by the record or not is beside the question at this time. It exists and must be reckoned with. There are hundreds of people in this part of the county who would rather put off the building of a system of good roads indefinitely than to help put through a project from which it would seem that Coos Bay would get the main benefit. It is no use to tell the people of the Myrtle Point territory that a connection with the interior by way of Coos Bay and the Umpqua will do them as much good as a direct route by way of the Middle Fork. It is not true and everybody knows it. They may not blame the Coos Bay people for the determination of Douglas County to abandon the old plan—and then again, they may. In any case, any change of plan, from whatever cause, will arouse the greatest bitterness in that section, and will meet with opposition that is liable to kill the whole project.

As a matter of fact, taking it for granted that the position now taken by Douglas County effectually kills the project of connection with the interior by way of the Middle Fork and leaves us no choice as to the connection we may make with the outside, the scheme is still a good one. The county needs a system of good roads for her own use, leaving out the consideration of tourist travel altogether. The trunk lines already planned for the system inside the county should be built—much sooner or later be built, and the sooner the work is done the better

GOOD PROGRESS ON BIG TUNNEL

Crews Advance at Rate of 100 Feet Per Month in Big Schofield Bore.

SCHOFIELD, OR., Nov. 13.—1000 lineal feet of rock has been taken out on the dump from the north portal of tunnel No. 7. This makes the average about 100 feet per month since work was started underground, though half of the time the work was prosecuted with hand drills. The present average is nearer 200 feet per month.

SUSLAW CLAIMS APPROVED.

Fourteen Applicants Get Land in Five Rivers Country.

EUGENE, OR., Nov. 13.—Fourteen claims, aggregating 1124 acres, in the Suslaw National Forest, have been approved officially by the local forestry office and the territory affected certified to the Interior department for entry.

The claims have been on file since early in July, when Chief Forester Graves investigated the territory and found that within the boundaries of the National Forest were many small tracts suitable for farming.

All the tracts approved lie in what is known as the Five Rivers country, in the extreme northwestern portion of Lane County. The country is rich. The approvals are in the interests of the following: T. F. Porter, 23 acres; William R. Speece, 60 acres; W. C. Stevens, 85 acres; Mrs. Josephine Bowen, 149 acres; Emmett Goff, 40 acres; V. E. Falkner, 90 acres; Dainey Day, 100 acres; Oscar Oleson, 68 acres; E. E. Melvin, 140 acres; J. T. Vining, 5 acres; E. E. Falkner, 22.5 acres; Anna Falkner, 40 acres; J. T. Meyers, 90 acres.

It is expected that more of the 174 applications in will be approved.

Former Coos Bay Resident and Roseburg Banker in Financial Difficulties.

T. R. Sheridan, a former well-known resident of Marshfield, and later president of a bank at Roseburg, has finally made an assignment to try and straighten out his financial affairs. Mr. Sheridan has been in bad straits for a year or more, as was stated in The Times a few months ago, but his many friends in this section were hopeful that he might be able to adjust affairs. Mrs. Sheridan was a former Coos Bay girl, being a sister of J. H. Flanagan, J. W. Flanagan, E. G. Flanagan, Mrs. T. H. Barry and Mrs. C. F. McCollum, of North Bend. Mr. Sheridan's only son, Geo., has been manager of the North Bend Condensary at North Bend, in which the former was largely interested. O. P. Coshaw was on the Bay some time ago trying to collect some notes and mortgages which Mr. Sheridan held against Coos County men. Concerning the latest developments in his case, the Roseburg News Tuesday gave the following particulars:

"T. R. Sheridan, former president of the defunct First National Bank, made a voluntary assignment in favor of Attorney O. P. Coshaw, of this city. The assignment was made upon request of his numerous creditors in this vicinity.

"When seen Attorney Coshaw said Sheridan's liabilities would far exceed \$100,000, while his assets would not reach that figure. According to Mr. Coshaw, his assets consist mostly of real estate, which is widely scattered. Not until a complete inventory is made will the creditors be able to estimate the extent of assets which must be pitted against the liabilities. "Mr. Sheridan is at present in San Francisco. The assignment came to light closely following Mr. Coshaw's return from San Francisco.
