MAIL YOUR PARCELS EARLY IS U. S. NOTICE

Burleson Makes Effort to Have All Gifts Delivered Before Christmas.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—"Mail your Christmas parcels early." This notice in big letters will be posted in every Postoffice in the country, at the instance of Postmaster-General Burleson, who proposes to see that all Christmas parcels shall be delivered on or before Christmas day if possible.

The first Christmas season of the parcel post system is almost at hand. Officials propose to see that every package shall be handled expeditiously, so that there will be no possibility of congestion. They believe they can give the public quick and accurate transportation and delivery if patrons only will aid by mailing their Christmas parcels early.
