

GOSSIP ABOUT CITY POLITICS

City Attorneyship Brought Up—Try to Get Saloons for McKeown.

Marshfield city politics are beginning to warm up a bit and the campaign will probably be on in earnest within a few days, although the election does not take place until December 2.

It was reported that an effort might be made on election day to swear in many votes, as the new law prohibiting the voters who have not registered from casting their ballot is questionable. In case they are, the sworn-in votes would probably have to go as "contested ones" and would not be effective until the questions in the new law are thrashed out in the Oregon Supreme Court.

Another yarn about the election involved the city attorneyship. Some of the supporters of Carl Albrecht for Mayor were attacking City Attorney Goss on the ground that he represented the C. A. Smith Company and consequently could not effectively represent the city in matters which involved the latter. Goss' friends laughed at this claim and pointed out that when matters affecting the C. A. Smith company, feeling the Smith company came up, like the question of opening South Front street, he had asked the Council to select another attorney to handle it and that Councilman Winkler and others had been authorized to do so.

Albrecht's friends are contending that if Allen is elected, Goss will be reappointed City Attorney. On the other hand, it is claimed that Albrecht has promised to appoint Harry G. Hoy City Attorney in case Albrecht is elected.

Saloons for McKeown.

It was also reported yesterday that the parties running the campaign of Arthur McKeown, son-in-law of J. W. Bennett, for Councilman, are endeavoring to line up all the saloons to support McKeown. It is doubtful if they will be able to do this as some of the liquor dealers are averse to mixing in city politics. They feel that if it is understood that the saloons are taking an active part in the city campaign, it will hasten the "wet" and "dry" fight locally, which, with the women voting, may end disastrously for the saloons.

Mixup Over Policy.

A funny tangle in politics was reported today. Some of the saloon men were opposing Allen on the ground that he recently declared in the Council meeting that he was opposed to the saloonmen and the W. C. T. U. of Marshfield is said to have met the other day and decided to oppose Allen because he was too friendly to the saloon men.

KINNEY TANGLE IS UNSOLVED

Reappointment of V. E. Watters as Receiver Desired to Make It Effective.

It was reported today that a new receivership suit in the Major Kinney matters would probably be instituted soon to secure the reappointment of V. E. Watters, the present receiver, in such a way that he will be empowered to go ahead and wind matters up.

It seems that under his present appointment, Judge Watters' powers as receiver are so limited that he cannot go ahead and wind up the affairs. He has proceeded and checked up the properties, listed the claims and figured out the various equities so that he will soon be able to proceed when enabled by the new appointment to do so.

In the new receivership proceedings, it is understood that the plan is to have F. B. Waite, John K. Kollock and the Shahan estate join with other large creditors. These now hold first mortgages and claims which practically tie the hands of the receiver, it is said.

It will probably be some time before there are any developments in F. B. Waite's foreclosure proceedings and even after that is disposed of, there will remain the Kollock mortgage and Shahan claims to be disposed of before the rank and file of the creditors can do much.

Action along the new line is expected shortly.

FUR RANCH IS HIS PROJECT

Wm. Carlson to Ship Foxes to Coos Bay from England for New Venture.

Wm. Carlson has just purchased a tract of land from A. Anderson near the waters of South Inlet and will soon start the first fur ranch in Coos County there. He plans to breed and raise some of the best fur-bearing animals that are obtainable to this climate and will also trap and hunt in that section.

He is arranging to fence in a small tract for mink and also for foxes and will rear them in captivity. The foxes he will have shipped here from England. How many he will start with he has not yet determined. He expects to catch the nucleus for the mink ranch. Recently he trapped about two dozen mink.

Carlson has been living at the George Parker home on Commercial avenue near Fourth street and will move to South Inlet soon. Today he had Justice Pennock send to Salem for a trapper's license for him.

GRIDER GIVEN TIME IN CASE

Accused Roundup Promoter Delays Entering Plea to Indictment.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 12.—When arraigned in Circuit Court this morning, Chas. Grider took until tomorrow morning in which to enter a plea to the indictment charging lewd cohabitation.

Grider's name also appears prominently as a co-defendant in the divorce proceedings recently filed against Mrs. Evelyn Foley, of Myrtle Creek, by her husband.

W. G. McLaren, general superintendent of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective Society, was here from Portland. Under direction of Judge Rice he will take "Mrs. Chas. Grider" and infant child to the Albertina Kerr Nursery Home in Portland. Her child will be cared for and she will be found employment of some kind. Florence Laird will also be taken to Portland by Mr. McLaren and placed in a home there.

Mr. McLaren also investigated some cases of youthful delinquency here and believes the parents of Roseburg do not realize the conditions that have been allowed to develop. One young girl is to go to the Louise home in Portland and others may be compelled to follow.

ARREST FOR BEATING BOY

Floyd Woodruff Denies Charges Made Against Him by C. H. Walter.

Floyd Woodruff, a barber employed in the O. K. shop on Front street, was arrested by Constable Cox this morning on the charge of assaulting Henry Walter, the fourteen-year-old son of C. H. Walter, last evening. A warrant for Woodruff was issued by Justice Pennock and the hearing was set for late this afternoon.

The charges were filed by C. H. Walter, the father of the boy. He said that his son had a black eye and was beaten up considerably. He claimed that Woodruff had assaulted his son when the latter went for his bicycle, which he alleged the Woodruff boy had taken off the street.

Woodruff told a different story. He denied assaulting the Walter boy, but said that the Walter boy had Woodruff's ten-year-old son down and was choking him severely when he told him to stop. Then he said the Walter boy turned on him and called him vile names and kicked him and almost put him out. He said that the Walter boy was some scrapper and could almost lick him, and from the description he gave Justice Pennock the Walter boy might be rated as a new "white hope." Woodruff declared that he did not strike the Walter boy but merely endeavored to keep him from hurting him. He promised to bring in several neighboring women to prove his contention that he was the one who was assaulted.

Woodruff lives near Anderson and Second streets and the trouble occurred last evening.

TO TRY CRAB THIS EVENING

Outing Club and Crab Club Will Arraign C. W. Montgomery Tonight.

Roland Bessey, assistant district attorney in San Francisco, who arrived yesterday on business, will preside at the trial of C. W. Montgomery, charged with the desecration of the Crab Club regalia, tonight.

The defendant, fearing he would be caught in the net of the Crab Club, made a request for a change of venue and the attorneys compromised by calling an outside justice.

The trial will start at 8:30 this evening at the lodge rooms of the Crab Club, over the Palace Cafe, and as some startling developments are expected the trial will not be public, only the members of the Crab and Coos Bay Outing Clubs and their friends attending.

A search warrant was issued this morning for the missing regalia, so if any members of the Coos Bay Outing Club find his room turned topsy-turvy he will know by these presents that Little Willie Richers, the summons-server, has been visiting in his absence.

Grand Crab J. T. Harrigan, when seen this morning, refused to discuss the situation, but said in confidence: "This is Crab soup for us. We will show the defendant and the powerful influences behind him that no man is above the law." Continuing, the Grand Crab said: "We have tried continually to bring this crab to justice but have repeatedly failed and now that he is caught in the net and the crabbing season is on, I firmly believe that he will be extracted from the ocean of membership in the Crab Club and suffer the ignominy of everlasting disgrace."

When seen today, Supreme Crab J. W. Flanagan said that C. W. Montgomery, the accused, would be given a fair and impartial trial. "If the accused is convicted," said the Supreme Crab, "no mercy will be shown him, and I firmly believe he will be a cracked crab before long."

A. K. Peck will defend Mr. Montgomery and J. C. Kendall will conduct the prosecution.

Many worshippers and the priests of the church saw the woman in prolonged meditation, but it was not until after a service that night that anyone sought to investigate the cause of her long prayer. Then it was discovered that she had suffered a stroke, was faint with hunger and unable to rise.
