SOME PIONEER NEWS.

(From the Coos Bay Times, published at Marshfield, Nov. 17, 1880.—Siglin & Bennett, publishers.)

Green Farrin moved to town last week. He rented his farm on Coos River.

W. Ed. Moore is going to take charge of the Satellite soon.

Mrs. Hacker, who has been absent on a visit to her old home in Maine, returned home on the Arcata last week.

The new schooner George C. Perkins left the wharf at this place laden with lumber for San Francisco last Saturday.

The new hotel is to be opened for business in a short time in Empire City. It is the largest hotel building in Southern Oregon.

M. Madegan is in charge of the I. T. R. R. Mr. Springer, who has been in charge for the last two years, has gone to San Francisco.

Mr. Howe, the pioneer nurseryman of Coos County, is canvassing for orders for trees. Mr. Howe's trees are always true to name, which is seldom the case with orders from abroad.

The entire vote cast in this county at the Presidential election was 1163. Of these 667 were Republican, 554 Democratic and two Greenback. The vote of this county is fully 1200, but there were quite a number of absentees and some paired off and did not attend election.

Mr. Richardson, who was blown a couple of hundred feet into the air at the time of the boiler explosion at Empire some time ago, has recovered and gone to work again. He was blown through the roof of the building and dropped 95 feet in a straight line from whence he started. His case is probably without a parallel.

Majorities are as follows: Republican, Coos River, 54; North Coos River, 10; Marshfield, 38; Empire, 10; Sumner, 16; Coos City, 4; Beaver Slough, 3; Bandon, 4; Ten Mile, 6; Coquille City, 1. Democratic, Burton Prairie, 18; Hall's Prairie, 4; Enchanted Prairie, 13; Brewster Valley, 2; Missouri, 20. Garfield's majority is three less than that of Hayes four years ago.

Wm. Gamble, a young man who has been logging on his father's land at Kentuck Slough during the summer, was brought to town on a stretcher last Tuesday on account of his leg being terribly mashed. It appears that he had charge of an ox team and was hauling down grade when one of the logs shot ahead of the team on the slippery grade and caught Mr. Gamble's leg against a stump, mashing it into a jelly, and holding his leg in this painful position until his younger brother hauled the log away with the team. Dr. Tower performed the operation of amputating the destroyed portion of the leg, and the young man, who is stopping at the Central Hotel, is doing well.

## FOOTBALL ON THANKSGIVING

Marshfield and North Bend Independents at North Bend  
—Play Coquille Later.

Arrangements have been practically concluded for a Thanksgiving football game between the Marshfield and North Bend independent teams to be played at North Bend next Thursday afternoon. The two teams have been picked out. Ted KISSAM is coaching the North Bend team, while it is likely that Weary Chandler, "Sue" Jones, an old Iowa football star and a number of others will aid in rounding the Marshfield eleven into shape.

There was talk of a game here with Coquille on Thanksgiving but it has been called off and it is now proposed to have the Marshfield team play at Coquille the following week and arrange for a return game to be played in Marshfield on Christmas day. There is considerable good talent, including some of the high school players. The probable lineups on Thanksgiving day will be:

North Bend—KISSAM and Sweet, ends; Thompson and Moore, tackles; Kibler and Bowen, guards; B. Davis, center; Dewey, quarter; Densmore and Hyde, halfbacks; Welling, fullback.

Marshfield—Tower and G. Johnson, ends; Hunter and A. Johnson, tackles; Kruse and Lyons, guards; Krueger, quarter; Woods and Stutzman, halfbacks; Sidney Clarke, fullback.

The Marshfield team will probably be named the Athletics. They will probably meet Weary Chandler, the former Oregon University star, as captain, coach and manager. KISSAM and Hyde are rounding the North Bend aggregation into shape.

WEST PROCLAIMS DAY.

Governor Officially Sets November 27 for Thanksgiving.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 21.—Governor West has issued the following Thanksgiving day proclamation:  
"It is an apt custom that has chosen the Autumn time for our Thanksgiving. It is the seasonal threshold betwixt the day of activity and evening of retrospection.  
"How fitting it is then, ere we go on, that we hesitate, consider and give our thanks to Him who is Almighty, for what of good we have been enabled to accomplish and for the privilege of future endeavor.  
"Our thanks should specially be rendered on high that the season has been most bountiful; that our nation these past twelve months has been spared the burdens and horrors of war, and that it has been blessed with a statesmanship to lead the toilers and those of great wealth unto a better understanding. For these and the manifold blessings of a great people, it is meet that we give united remembrance to our Father.  
"Now, therefore, in accordance with a time-honored custom, I, Oswald West, Governor, by virtue of the authority in me vested, designate Thursday, November 27, 1913, as a day of public Thanksgiving throughout the commonwealth and ask that for the tasks of our daily bread there then be substituted appropriate and reverent services to Him."
