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ANSON ROGERS IS QUITE ILL

WEALTHY PIONEER AND FATHER OF A. O. ROGERS REPORTED TO BE IN RATHER CRITICAL CONDITION NOW.

Anson Rogers, one of Coos Bay's best known pioneers, is reported to be in a rather critical condition at his home on Coos River. He has been suffering from a general breakdown incident to his advanced years and his relatives and friends feel considerable apprehension concerning him.

Mr. Rogers is eighty-five years old and has been a resident of Coos Bay for many years. He is one of the wealthiest men in this section, having extensive Marshfield holdings as well as other real estate.

He has been poorly since he suffered a slight attack of paralysis here a year or so ago.

HUNT IN CURRY.

Portland Baseball Players Got Four Black Bears.

A Portland paper says: "Bill Rodgers, Bill James, Harry Thielman and E. A. Robinson, who have been hunting in Curry County, arrived in Portland.
