Recovers Boat.—J. A. Hillstrom has recovered his boat which was taken a few weeks ago from the commercial avenue dock.

Court Convenes.—Judge Hall left on the morning train for Coquille to conduct County Court. A number of minor matters will come up for consideration, but no great volume of business is reported.

Two Steamers Depart.—The steamers Breakwater and Redondo, bound respectively for Portland and San Francisco, the former delayed 24 hours by a bad bar and the latter by a cracked cylinder head, left the harbor Sunday at noon for their destinations.

Kernan Repeats.—P. K. Kernan, a worker in logging camps, was up before Recorder Butler Saturday on the charge of being drunk. On being released after a promise that he would return to work, Kernan proceeded to load up again, and he has been spending the week end at the Hotel de Carter.

Floating Clogs Harbor.—During the freshest and high tides last week logs which had laid on the shore above water mark, branches of trees, boxes, planks and a miscellaneous collection of buoyant junk in large quantities floated out on the harbor and yesterday afternoon huge logs formed an actual menace to boats, both large and small. It is expected that the lower tides will float the driftwood out to sea.

Miss Roseburg Stage.—Mr. and Mrs. Roland A. Wernick, who engaged passage on the Breakwater, and who decided to take the Roseburg stage route on learning that the steamer would be late leaving

for Portland, failed to arrive at Myrtle Point on Saturday evening in time to catch the stage, according to word received here today. Mr. Wernick is going to Portland on business, and Mrs. Wernick, who is in poor health, will go to San Jose for an extended visit.

Repair Damage.—Roy H. Rozelle, now in charge of the Government river and harbor work in this section, left today for Bandon to repair the break in the embankment between the lighthouse keeper's residence and the jetty. This break, made by the high tides last week, has been threatened for some time, but the repairing of it was postponed. Mr. Rozelle thinks it can be easily repaired if no worse than the reports from there indicate. If allowed to go long, it might result in seriously hampering the channel.

Planks Coming Loose.—The planking on North Front street is getting in bad shape from being rammed into the mud by passing vehicles and yesterday it was noticed that a number of the timbers had jumped out of the collar holding them and formed bad ditches, capable of causing injury to people in automobiles or other vehicles. With whole sections of the planking showing signs of getting into the same condition, thus early in the winter, the chances are that the roadway will be in very bad shape by spring. Pools of water forming underneath the planking combined with the pounding of passing autos appears to be the main cause of the damage.

Returns Here.—E. B. Jones, of the Coos Bay Realty Company, has returned by stage from a business trip to San Francisco, returning via stage. At San Francisco he met some of the Southern Pacific officials and was assured that the Coos Bay-Eugene line would soon be in operation from Eugene to Acme. He was also informed that when the present Coos Bay mail-carrying contract expires next June that the railway would bid on bringing it in via Florence and down the coast, the length of stage service being reduced about one-half and there being a better stage road down the coast than across the mountains.

School Census 908.—Final figures of the school census of marshfield show that the number is larger than was estimated, the increase being 44 over the figures of last year. The total is 908, consisting of 479 boys and 429 girls. Last year the total was 864.
