Final Census Figures.—Judge Hall, secretary of the school board, stated yesterday that the final and correct count of the school census in Marshfield shows 478 boys and 427 girls, a total of 905.

Father Killed.—H. B. Hartsie, a rancher living about seven miles from Elkton on Brush Creek, was killed in an accident there last Saturday, his wagon upsetting. He was seventy-one years old. A daughter of the deceased is said to live in Marshfield.

On Good Roads.—The good roads committee was in session at Coquille yesterday and it is expected that the body will present a petition to the county commissioners today regarding road improvements in this county. On December 10 the county commissioners, roadmasters and county judge will meet similar officials of various counties in the state in Portland to join in the deliberations toward a state highway.

Will Rush Work.—That no time will be lost in the construction of a sewer on North Front street from Elm to Hemlock streets was indicated this morning when Messrs. McLean & McLean, the contractors who were awarded the work Monday night, appeared on the scene and outlined the preliminary construction. Hugh McLean stated that he

expected the job would be completed within the next three weeks.

Bay City Meeting.—The Marshfield M. E. Brotherhood will conduct a meeting at Bay City tonight.

Meet Friday.—A monthly meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce will be held Friday evening.

Are Coming.—Henry H. Fletcher and Minnie T. Staddalman, of St. Louis, who are the principals in the Fletcher estate case involving much Coos County property, will arrive on the Breakwater tomorrow.

Alice H. on Ways.—The gasoline launch Alice H., owned by Frank Smith, of South Coos River, who is in charge of the state fish hatchery at that point, has been hauled out on the ways of the Pioneer Boat Works for a thorough overhauling and painting.

North Bend Meeting.—Nineteen members of the Marshfield Christian Church went to North Bend last evening and attended a social and banquet given by the new congregation which is organizing there. A musical program followed by a banquet with talks by C. A. Schibrede and Rev. Gregg. The North Bend congregation may start a church soon.

Jim McCahey Arrested.—Charged with fishing with a net in the closed season, Jim McCahey was arrested this afternoon by Water Bailiff A. A. Nicholls while using Martin Olson's fishing outfit on the mud flats opposite the city for flounder. He was brought before Justice Pennoek and will be held until the return of Prosecuting Attorney from Coquille.

Rebuilding Freak.—The flat-bottomed gasoline launch Freak, of the Coos Bay Ice and Cold Storage Company, is hauled out on the ways of the Pioneer Boat Works and is being remodelled to provide more accommodations for passengers. The Freak was built for freighting work on South Coos River, but she proved so staunch and fast that she became a favorite with the passengers. Consequently her cabin is being enlarged and fitted comfortably for taking care of increased traffic.

Get Rock.—Councilman Duncan Ferguson and Carl Albrecht went to Coquille this morning and conferred with the County Court about getting rock for the street work in Marshfield. The County Commissioners stated that they had eleven teams hauling rock for county work and that they had not been able to spare much rock. The Councilmen showed them that the delay was hard on Marshfield people who needed the streets and finally it was agreed that within a week the Commissioners would furnish all the rock needed and would start in with two carloads today. About thirty cars are needed. The Commissioners showed a disposition to do all they could for the city without hampering their own work and this was appreciated by Messrs. Ferguson and Albrecht.
