

DEBATE HELD ON DIRECT PRIMARY

PRESIDENT'S RECOMMENDATION FOR SELECTION OF PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES UPHeld BY PROGRESSIVE REPUBLICANS.

 WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 4.—President Wilson's recommendation for the direct primary election of presidential candidates came up in the Senate today in a debate that held that body more than an hour, during which Senators Bristow, Cummins and others expressed the hope that the democrats would follow the President in support of a reform which, they declared, the Progressive Republicans had long demanded. Senator Martin replied that the democrats were "in entire accord with the titular head and actual head of the Democratic party." Bristow and Cummins said the democrats should prove it by approving the bill introduced by the Progressive Republicans early in the season. Bristow has introduced such a bill, modeled after the Kansas law.

PARIS STOCKS DROP SUDDENLY

 PARIS, Dec. 4.—The lowest quotations ever recorded for French 3 per cent Rentes was reached on the Paris Bourse yesterday when the price fell to eighty-four francs, seventy-five centimes. The sudden decline was a consequence of the fall of the cabinet under the premiership of J. Louis Barthou, which was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies last night when it insisted upon the immunity of government bonds from taxation. Other securities were also affected by the ministerial crisis.
 Among those mentioned as likely to head the new cabinet are Senator Jean Dupuy, former premier, and Senator Paul Louis Peytral, formerly Minister of Finance.
