Loses Lambs.—Parties from the Coquille report that Claude Nosler, of Bridge, states that during the last year, varmints have killed over seventy lambs in his flock.

Ferry Traffic.—Capt. Alex Hall, of the Ferry Transit, reports that during the month of November the ferry Transit carried 5942 passengers, 149 autos, 96 double teams, 261 rigs and 92 head of stock.

Has Big Crew.—Jack McDonald was down from the McDonald & Vaughan camp on Daniels Creek last night and reports that they now have between ninety and 100 men employed there. The moving of the old camp and railway was about completed a month ago and everything is now going fine.

Being Raised Up.—The Hotel Dotson, on First street, is the next building on the land beyond Mill Slough to be raised to the level of the rest in that vicinity preparatory to the fill to be made by the dredge Seattle. A force of men commenced operations yesterday and it is expected that the large structure will prove an important job.

Given Damages.—E. D. McNutt, whose trunk was damaged when a big wave hit the stage coming from Gardiner to Jarvis landing during the high tides, was awarded \$100 yesterday by an arbitration committee to which the claim was referred by Capt. Holden. McNutt only asked first for \$50, but J. L. Koontz and wife and Tom Holand, after hearing what the trunk contained decided Mr. McNutt was entitled to \$100.

Lawyers Are Busy.—A census of Marshfield for legal lights this morning would have indicated that Marshfield would be a prolific field for new lawyers, unless the census taker had been down to see the morning flyer taking an army of bar talent to attend court in Coquille. Attorneys were at a high premium today, and it is expected that many will be kept busy at the county seat for a number of days.
