

## ELECTION VOTE IS CANVASSED

Figures Correctly Given in Times—Ordinances Passed For Street Grading.

A canvas of the vote in the city election Tuesday was effected at a special meeting of the Council last night, and on motion of Councilman Cople and seconded by Councilman Albrecht, the figures were approved. They were exactly as printed in The Times of yesterday. The formal election of the various candidates winning was confirmed and then the investigation into the Doyle case was carried out and finished.

Just before adjourning, Recorder Butler read the ordinance providing for establishing grades on Elm avenue between Third and Fourth streets, and on Seventh street between Johnson and Ingersoll. Both ordinances were passed.

It was decided to adjourn until December 15, allowing the meeting last night to take the place of the regular meeting of next Monday.

## AUTO DRIVERS SCORED AGAIN

City Attorney Instructed to Draw Up Ordinance Providing for Public Safety.

Further complaints against the automobiles operating between Marshfield and North Bend, but of a different nature from the last, were made before the City Council at its special meeting last night. Councilman Evertson declared that the turning of the machines at the intersection of the city streets, especially at the corner of Anderson and First, near the Chandler Hotel, was dangerous.

The Councilman stated that in frequent cases, when the passenger autos made a complete circle at the intersections, other machines coming along found it hard to avoid collision, and that pedestrians had to jump lively to keep from being knocked down. He asked that an ordinance be passed compelling the autos to circle the block when turning, instead of taking the shorter method.

City Attorney Goss was asked regarding the city's rights in the matter and stated that such an ordinance was lawful. He said that some cities compelled machines to turn around whole blocks. In others they had to cross the street at intersections and make a complete turn on the right hand sides of the streets from the driver. Others were compelled to turn at the middle of a block.

The City Attorney was finally instructed to draw up an ordinance enforcing the procedure of the autos turning around the block instead of at intersections.

Goss stated that he had been approached by one of the chauffeurs with an offer that if they would be fined only \$5 all nine of those whose trials for speeding had not yet been held, would plead guilty. He stated that he had declined and the members of the Council supported him in this decision. It is expected the trials will be held during the latter part of the week.

## STEAMER HAS FINE PASSAGE

Breakwater Arrives in Harbor Early With Capacity List of Passengers and Cargo.

Making a fine passage from Portland, the steamer Breakwater, Captain Macgeen, arrived in the harbor this morning at 7:45 o'clock with ninety-two first-class cabin passengers and a large number in the steerage. She brought a full cargo of general merchandise and miscellaneous freight and shifted up to the Marshfield dock from North Bend shortly before ten o'clock.

Captain Macgeen stated that the weather on the way down the coast was clear and fine and that the Breakwater crossed the Columbia and Coos Bay bars like a duck.

The steamer left Portland at 8:15 Tuesday night, but when she reached the opening of the Willamette into the Columbia, a very thick, low fog settled down on the water, and she was forced to stop for seven or eight hours before proceeding down the river. She crossed the Columbia bar at 3:05 the next afternoon and arrived off the Coos Bay entrance in a heavy fog at 5:30 this morning, making a very fast passage down the coast.

## CAPT. REED ON BAR DREDGE

Former Gardiner Man Given Charge of Michie—Soundings Show Bar Shoaling.

John C. Reed, formerly of Gardiner and well known on Coos Bay, has been appointed captain of the bar dredge Michie, which is to operate on the Coos Bay bar. It was announced some time ago that a Seattle man had been chosen for the place, but it seems that he was acting only temporary. The announcement of the appointment of Capt. Reed will be welcome news to his many Coos Bay friends. The Michie is still at Puget Sound where alterations in the craft are being made. She will be tested on the Columbia bar before being brought here, according to Captain Macgeen, so that it will be some time after the first of the year before she can come. Then owing to the winter storms, it is not expected that she will be able to do much before next spring or summer.

Bar Is Shoaling. Captain Macgeen today secured a blue print of old soundings of the Coos Bay bar and entrance and also a more recent profile showing the latest soundings. These show that the bar has shoaled badly in many places, showing from six to ten and some places fifteen feet or more of a shoal since the earlier soundings. The latest soundings have been taken off on transparent paper and when placed over the old blue print plainly show the contrast and need of immediate action to prevent the shoals becoming a more serious menace to navigation.

Capt. Macgeen says Coos Bay ought to have a strong delegation at Washington now to see that Coos Bay gets Federal aid at this session of Congress.
