Federal Troops, Civilians, Women and Children Hurrying From Rebel Rule.

WEALTHY MEXICANS BOUND FOR TEXAS

Reconstruction of Utilities in Northern Mexico is Begun by Conquerors.

By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times. PRESIDIO, Tex., Dec. 6.—3000 federal troops and civilians, including women and children, who fled from Chihuahua upon the evacuation of that city, are nearing the United States border.

The refugees, who travel fifteen miles daily, are in wagons, carriages and about. Among them are the families of Luis Terrazas and other wealthy Mexicans. The United States troops and the Mexican consul from El Paso arrived today to take charge of the refugees when they should cross the border.

RECONSTRUCTION BEGINS

First Semblance of Peace in Sight Northern Mexico.

JUAREZ, Dec. 6.—Reconstruction of telegraph lines and rebuilding of railroads, marking the first semblance of peaceful industry in northern Mexico in many months, occupied General Francisco Villa's rebel army today. The main body of the army has reached Civalito, about eighty miles north of Chihuahua City. Almost the entire line from Juarez to the south is guarded by rebels to prevent any fugitive rebel troops from interrupting it. Both the telegraph and the railroad are still only a temporary state of repair. Villa believes the federal troops have been routed thoroughly.

EGG BOYCOTT LOWERS PRICE

Washington Society Women Sign Petition for U. S. Law Against Food Monopoly.

By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times. WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The million signatures attempted today to stop the exhibition buildings here, which have just been closed for the winter months.

Only other work that now remains to be done is the final roundup for signatures to the petition that will be presented to Congress at an early date asking removal of legislation to prevent food monopolies. During the last week prices in Washington have declined from sixty to fifty cents a dozen.

CITY COUNCIL TO RATIFY TERMINAL TRANSFER TODAY

SALE OF STEAM FRANCHISE IN MARSHFIELD TO SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO BE APPROVED AT 4 O'CLOCK TODAY.

The Marshfield City Council will meet in special session at 4 o'clock this afternoon for the purpose of ratifying the sale of the steam franchise of the Terminal Railway to the Southern Pacific.

The steam franchise which are to be transferred are said to cover North Front street from the North Bend city limits to the Alliance warehouse and Front street south with possibly a few other streets.

The electric franchise which the Terminal Railway holds and which covers all of the other principal streets of Marshfield, will be retained by them and they have five years in which to build the lines and meet the franchise conditions.

Under the arrangement, it is understood that the Southern Pacific will not enter Broadway at any point but will have private right of way through the Alliance warehouse and Smith retail lumber yards and provision yards.

The details of the transfer will not be made public until after the Council meeting this afternoon.

ULSTER'S ARMS BEING SEIZED BIG SCHOONER HIT BY STORM

Proclamation Forbids Importation of Arms and Ammunition Into Ireland.

By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times. BELFAST, Ireland, Dec. 6.—The greatest excitement has been created here among the Ulster Unionists by the royal proclamation prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition into Ireland.

During the night rifles, bayonets and ammunition were removed from Belfast to country towns for fear the government authorities might put the Irish Crimes Act into force and seize the war stores already collected. The customs authorities made their first seizure under the terms of the proclamation today.

Aloha, Four-master, Becomes Unmanageable and Captain and Crew Row for Tug.

SEATTLE, Dec. 6.—The four-masted wooden schooner Aloha, from Fiji for Grays Harbor in ballast, was struck by a storm off the Washington coast last Sunday and became unmanageable. Captain Peterson and his crew of ten rowed to Destruction Island, where they found shelter at the lighthouse. The vessel is anchored in fifteen fathoms of water and her anchors are barely holding. The tug Daring has gone from Hoquiam to take off the men and save the schooner if possible. Another big storm is approaching the coast.

SNOW CAUSES FUEL FAMINE

Denver Hotels and Office Buildings May Close Because of Blocked Streets

DENVER, Dec. 5.—After a night spent by 1500 laborers in shoveling the snow deposited by the two day storm which has held all Colorado in its grasp, the streets of Denver were opened today to some traffic. Policemen, however, stood at the corners of the streets which had been made passable and refused thoroughfare to all vehicles except coal wagons, street cars, milk wagons and provision wagons.

The demand for coal has become exceedingly great and because delivery cannot be made in many cases it is feared that many hotels and office buildings will have to close because of the cold. An equally serious condition has confronted the city in the matter of provision deliveries. Virtually all the streets in the residence section are impassable and the food supply in the homes is becoming exhausted.

HOLD SHERIDAN IN ROSEBURG

Former Coos Bay Man Indicted for Forgery and Getting Money Fraudulently.

By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times. ROSEBURG, Or., Dec. 6.—T. R. Sheridan was indicted for obtaining money on false pretenses from Mrs. Laura Verrell, to the amount of \$2000. He was also indicted for forgery, it being alleged that he signed a note for \$5000 to E. P. Prebble with his own name and that of John Servis. He gave bond for \$5000 on each count, they being signed instantly by prominent citizens and bankers of Roseburg. Sheridan says he can show authority for his acts. The case is set for trial next February. Judge Hamilton will not preside then.

From Coos Bay. Mr. Sheridan formerly lived in Marshfield, his wife being a daughter of the late Pat Flanagan and having several brothers and sisters here and at North Bend. He was until recently head of a Roseburg bank, but recently made an assignment owing to his financial reverses. He has many friends on the Bay, who will regret the troubles that have befallen him.

SACKS WANTED AT HAINES FEED STORE.

Hugh Finley Identifies Suspect Arrested at Prosper as Man Who Made Overtures.

ARREST G. H. MILLER IN MARSHFIELD FOR IT Hope to Land Third Man Who Is Supposed to Have Coin—Grand Jury Probes Case.

COQUILLE, Or., Dec. 6.—Hugh Finley, whose father lives here, is said to be the star witness against Frank Vaughan, alias Woods, Smith and Bonds, who is being held here as a suspect in the Myrtle Point Bank robbery case. Finley is alleged to have told the grand jury which is now investigating the case that Vaughan, or whatever his name may be, came to him and two others with a proposition to rob the bank and declaring that "it was dead easy and no danger of being caught."

Who the three others are is a question, but Finley says that he would not join in with them. Some suspect, that G. H. Miller, the alleged cook, who was arrested in Marshfield last night, was one of them. The third, who has not been apprehended, is supposed to have the stolen coin with him.

Finley is said to have positively identified Vaughan, Woods, Smith or Bonds as the man who came to him with the proposition to rob the Myrtle Point bank.

Miller Denies All.

G. H. Miller, who was brought over this morning from Marshfield by Sheriff Gage, positively denies knowing the other suspect and neither one of them shows any signs of having ever seen the other before.

Miller says he came from Denver, Colo., about two months ago and is said to have cooked in a Myrtle Point restaurant for a time. He came to Coquille the Saturday before the Myrtle Point bank robbery and Saturday night did a lot of telephoning to two other men who went to Myrtle Point. He is said to have a wife at Falls City, Oregon. He is about six feet two inches tall, weighs about 150 pounds, has a ruddy, fair complexion and is smooth shaven. He is about 26 years old. His hands indicate that he has not been doing any hard labor.

Sold Horses in North Bend.

Proprietor Hakanson of the North Bend stables bought the team of iron gray horses which Woods, or whatever his name may be, is accused of having stolen from the estate of Liberty Haines, who was shot near Ekeley, by his brother-in-law, Hugh Hampton, a few weeks ago. The horses were ranging over the Coos county line near some creek. They were iron grays and Hakanson is said to have paid Woods, as he claimed his name was, \$100 for the team. Hakanson's description of the man from whom he bought the team tallies perfectly with that of the suspect in jail here. Woods told Hakanson that he brought the team in from the outside. The Adelsperger team has not been located.

Sheriff Gage has also been informed that Woods, under the name of Vaughan, spent considerable time in the office of Attorney Mullen of North Bend on the claim that he wanted Mullen to look up some estate for him. It is now suspected that Woods was framing up a robbery on the Bank of Oregon, like he is alleged to have pulled off in Myrtle Point, as Mullen's office is directly over the Bank of Oregon's vault.

Wanted for Felony.

Woods, or whatever his name, denies that he is the man that is wanted in Yreka for a felony, the exact nature of which is not known, but Deputy Sheriff Clyde Gage thinks that he is the man. Mr. Gage says that he is also wanted some place else for a crime.

Officers Feel Certain.

Sheriff Gage and Deputy Sheriff Gage appear confident that they have the right man or men, although Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist does not appear so confident.

Mr. Liljeqvist thinks that they have evidence to convict Woods on the horse stealing charge, but will know more when the witnesses in this case appear before the grand jury Monday.

Now Seek Money.

The officers feel certain that there were three men in the Myrtle Point bank robbery and think that the principal thing that remains to be discovered is the missing money, a little over \$10,000 in cash. They believe that the third man is sticking close to where this was cached.
