Steamers Here Tomorrow.—The steam schooner Redondo, with passengers from San Francisco, will arrive in the harbor tomorrow morning. She will take on a cargo of lumber at the C. A. Smith mill, shifting to the Alliance dock early on Saturday for southbound passengers. The Breakwater will arrive in tomorrow from Portland and the Alliance is due to arrive here from the same port on Saturday.

Mr. Kreis says the townsite of Cooscon is to be developed and that it will eventually become one of the commercial centers of this section of the state."
