

# TELLS HOW TO PREVENT FIRES

Dan B. Keating Makes Good Suggestions About Xmas

Chief Dan Keating of the Marshfield Fire Department has issued the following good suggestions as a means of preventing fires by exercising care in the decoration:

I would like to offer a few suggestions to stores, churches and housewives along the lines of education in fire prevention during the holiday season, when such buildings are usually crowded.

Light and inflammable material make fires easy to start and easy to spread. A match, a gas flame, an electric globe may do it.

First, Do not make any changes in electric wiring without first consulting the electrical inspector.

Second, do not decorate your Christmas tree with paper, cotton or any other inflammable material. Use metallic tinsel and other non-inflammable decorations only, and set the tree securely so that the children in reaching for things cannot tip it over. Do not use cotton for decorations to represent snow. If you must have snow use asbestos fibre. Cotton or other inflammable decorations should be dipped in a solution of phosphate of ammonia and water.

Do not leave matches in reach of the children so that they can get them to relight candles. They frequently set their clothes afire instead. Remember the children imitate their elders. The tree itself will burn when the needles become dry.

Electric lights should not be dressed in paper petticoats, as there is enough heat in each bulb to set fire to the paper.

Keep water, sand or fire extinguisher handy. Put a sheet of tin under the Christmas tree.

Above all don't forget that the fire department is ready at all times to respond to calls a few minutes after the alarm is turned in. But that you can do yourselves and the fire department more good by observing a few rules of prevention, as the real value of a good department lies in the fact that they are giving you most of the protection required by endeavoring to prevent fires.

## WAS A PIONEER IN CALIFORNIA

Father of J. L. Koontz, of Marshfield, Passes Away in Sacramento

J. L. Koontz returned yesterday from Sacramento, where he was called last week by the sad news of the death of his father. He arrived in time to attend the funeral.

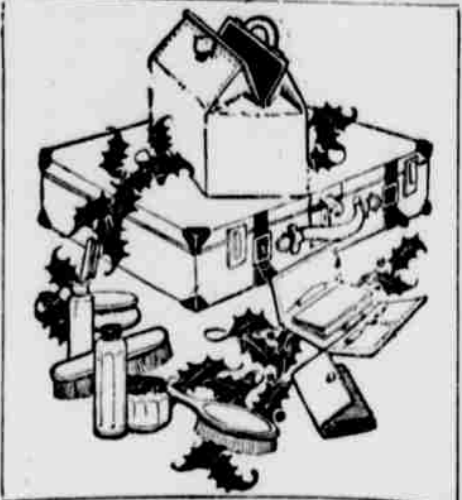

### NEW AUTO STAGE SERVICE FOR EASTPORT

D. L. Foote Will Establish Auto Service to First Addition and Other Points.

Beginning today D. L. Foote established an auto service to Eastport. The cars will leave Eastport daily at 6:45 a. m., and the next one at 8:45 a. m. A car will leave Marshfield at 12 o'clock noon and returning leave Eastport at 12:45. Another car will leave Marshfield at 6:45 p. m. A night car will leave Marshfield at 9 p. m.

The schedule has been arranged for the convenience of the patrons and to give the best possible service. The fare will be 15 cents from Eastport and 10 cents from Johnson street.

Mr. Foote is also planning to establish a city auto service with a uniform fare of 10 cents.

The night service will enable Eastport people to take in the shows and ride home immediately afterward. The low rates on city service will enable people to take in the shows regardless of the weather, cars leaving from all show houses after each show and the service being conducted similar to a regular street car service.

A rate of fifteen cents to and

from depot will be made and will connect with all trains. This service will be of great convenience to business men who have to walk to and from their places of business.
