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CONTROVERSY
OVER OFFICEGovernor Lister and Regents
of Washington University
Have Disagreement

SEATTLE, Dec. 30.—The controversy between Governor Lister and the board of regents over the summary removal of President Thomas W. Kane of the University of Washington does not change the status of President Kane at all. Tomorrow will be his last day as president, and on Thursday Professor Henry Landes will become acting president, to serve until the end of the college year.

Next September the "big" man who is to be the permanent president will take charge. This man is being sought but it is feared that the publication of the difficulties among the present regents and the Governor may deter some man of ability from considering the position.

The situation today is that Regents John A. Rea and Eldridge Wheeler are in good standing with the Governor; Regents H. Walker, F. A. Hazeltine and A. L. Rogers have resigned and Regents John C. Higgins and Alex McEwan have been asked by the Governor to resign and have refused, but it is believed the Governor has the power to remove them. It is expected that the Governor will nominate five new regents in a few days.

LOGGERS NEED
FRESHETS NOWHeavy Rains and High Water
Desired to Get Out Many
Logs in Streams

It is not often that rain or a freshet is being anxiously desired and awaited on Coos Bay, but such is the case now. The Smith-Powers Logging Company and a number of other smaller logging concerns are anxiously awaiting heavy rains and a freshet of considerable proportion to enable them to get their logs out from a number of points.

A. H. Powers stated yesterday that two or three of his camps were practically at their limit until the logs could be got out and nothing could be done. In some of the streams he is afraid to put in more logs because he now has all the logs in them that his booms will hold and in case of a freshet taking them out, he would be unable to take care of additional ones. However, if a freshet comes now, it will give him an opportunity to take care of the present hundred million or so he has and to put in another supply.

Henry Hoeck, who is getting out logs in the Smith Basin for the Smith-Powers Company, and also for the North Bend Lumber Company, has about all the logs cut that it can store until a freshet takes out the supply on hand.

The Gould Company and a number of other companies are in a similar predicament. They want to make a big cut this winter so that they can get them out on the spring freshet and yet with the present supply on hand, cannot very well put in more logs until the present supply is cared for.

CATHOLICS TO
BUILD CHURCHRev. Father A. R. Munro Is
Having Plans Prepared—
New School Gymnasium

Rev. Father A. R. Munro is having plans prepared for a fine new Catholic church to be erected in Marshfield next spring or summer if present arrangements materialize. The edifice will probably cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

It is understood that Father Munro will have several architects compete in submitting plans for the edifice and the best set of plans will be selected.

The church is to be built on South Sixth street where the old church stood. The site has been graded and the old church moved to the rear of the property where it can be used during the erection of the new edifice.

Plan for Gymnasium.

The Marshfield School board at its next meeting will probably take steps to carry out the plans for erecting a gymnasium and swimming pool. This was favorably voted upon at the last election and it is likely that about \$10,000 or so will be put into the building and equipment. The building is to be located near the high school and it will probably be built in the early spring.

Church At Coquille.

The Rev. Father McDevitt, who was recently appointed to the North Bend Catholic parish, is organizing a Catholic congregation at Coquille and it is likely that steps will be taken towards the erection of a church there the coming summer.

CAPE BLANCO
RECORDS GALEWind Blows Sixty Miles an
Hour and Is Felt Here—
Barometer Down Low

Stormy weather off Cape Blanco was reported to Wireless Operator Williamson of the Marshfield station this morning, with a wind from the south blowing at the rate of sixty miles an hour and the barometer low. Rain was falling and the sea was rough, the temperature being 50 degrees.

The same wind reached Marshfield today about noon and swirled through the streets and shook up the frame buildings in lively shape. The waters of the harbor lost their placid appearance for the time being and shakiness creaked and groaned. The wind brought warmer atmosphere to this section from the south and after the morning rain the weather was like that during early in March.

Wireless reports from the Columbia River stated that rain was falling, with a southeaster blowing at the rate of 34 miles an hour. The temperature was 42, the barometer recorded 29.40 and the sea and bar were smooth.

From Cape Mendocino the report gave the wind as west at the rate of 45 miles an hour, temperature 52, barometer 29.48 and the sea rough, with the sky overcast.

The barometer at Cape Blanco recorded 29.18, the lowest at any point on the coast.

No reports of anything unusual in the shipping line were received by the wireless operator.

CARRANZA GOES NORTH.
Preparing To Make Real Attack On
Guaymas Defenders.

HERMOSILLO, Dec. 29.—General Carranza, Constitutionalist chief, has gone to Carho, midway between Hermosillo and Nogales on the American border. The reason for his unexpected departure for the north was not made known. The insurgent campaign will be pressed against Guaymas, the California Gulf port in southern Sonora, which has been held so stubbornly by General Pedro O'Leary's Federals.

This was announced at this place simultaneously with the departure for the south of the entire first regiment of cavalry. There are already in the vicinity of Guaymas more than 2000 rebel infantry, for the most part composed of Yaqui and Mayo Indians.
