BATTLE IN PROGRESS

Federals Still Holding Original Position in Face of Fierce Attack

MARFAT, Texas, Jan. 3.—Reports brought yesterday from Ojinaga, where the Federal army is being attacked by General Ortega's rebels, were that the battle still is in progress. The Federals were holding the position, while 6000 rebels were apparently delaying to close in.

The order of Secretary of War Garrison regarding the crossing of refugees to the American side was regarded by the border patrol as clearly defining the situation. Heretofore refugees not wounded had been forced back. Many deserters on being forced back after their arms had been taken from them pleaded they certainly would be killed.

It is believed that Major Nance, after disarming those who cross will permit them to remain on this side if their lives are in danger. It was reported that many of General Orozco's volunteers were among the deserters.

SECURE AMMUNITION

Rebel Front Preparations Indicate Another Attack on Tampico

By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times. TAMPICO, Jan. 3.—Artillery and ammunition are reaching the rebel front in such a manner as to indicate that an early attack may be made on Tampico, or on a force of 1200 Federal troops entrenched at Altamira, twenty-three miles from the coast. Several pieces of artillery and a large supply of ammunition were delivered to the rebels at Cervantes today.

Neither Side Wins

PRESIDIO, Jan. 3.—Though the battle continued until late yesterday neither side had won a decisive victory. The rebels were shelling the town with apparently little effect. The rebels killed and wounded now exceeds those of the Federals.

Fighting at Laredo
