# ANSON ROGERS WILL OPENED

**PROPERTY REMAINS INTACT DURING MRS. ROGERS' LIFE AND THEN DIVIDED AMONG CHILDREN—VALUED AT \$75,000.**

The will of Anson Rogers, the late Coos River pioneer, was filed for probate today. His estate is estimated at upwards of \$75,000, being smaller than generally supposed, owing to much of his property being in his wife's name or in their joint names.

The will provides that the whole estate shall remain intact during Mrs. Rogers' life, and that she shall be executor without bond. After her death, it is to be divided as follows:

To Anson Otis Rogers—Rogers ranch on Coos River, Rogers building property, including the Busy Corner property, lot where D. Musen's stables are located, and three houses and lots on North Second street.

To Mrs. Eldridge—Lot in Empire and Central Hotel property at Front and Market.

To children of late Mrs. J. L. Bowman—His half interest in Coos building and property.

The will was made in 1911.
