CRAFT MEETS TERRIFIC SEAS

Mass of Unbroken Foam on Columbia Bar and Hurricane Delays Breakwater

Delayed nearly twenty-four hours by terrific seas breaking clear across the Columbia River bar, the steamer Breakwater arrived in the harbor yesterday afternoon from Portland with a big list of passengers and a good-sized cargo. She arrived off the entrance to Coos Bay about 1 o'clock, but was compelled to await a flood tide to come through the breakers.

Speaking of the Breakwater being bar bound at the Columbia, the Astorian of Thursday says:

"Captain Maegen came down from Portland with the Breakwater yesterday with his usual number of passengers for Coos waters and went below to cross out, but the Breakwater turned back and took her berth at the O. W. R. & N. piers at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, an act which absolutely confirmed every mind on the waterfront of Astoria that there was indeed 'something big doing' on the Columbia bar, for when Captain Maegen refuses to take his ship to sea, no other conclusion is at all tenable here. He has not failed to cross out, nor in, since he and the Breakwater have been plying between Portland and Marshfield that anyone can recall. Persons coming up from the lower harbor report the bar smashing in a field of unbroken foam, from Clatsop Sands to Peacock Spit, all of yesterday, and the fact that up to 10 o'clock last night not a craft had crossed in or out left little hope that the big feet awaiting to pass out would get away today."

All of the way down from the Columbia the Breakwater met a terrific head sea and wind, the latter approaching hurricane velocity. The passenger list was as follows:
