EPIDEMIC OF MEASLES HERE

Many Children and Grown-ups Afflicted—More Severe at Eugene

While North Bend and Marshfield have been suffering from an epidemic of the measles, the disease has not reached the stage of proportions that it has in many other Oregon towns. The disease, as manifest here, has been in a very light form and children afflicted with it have scarcely been sick, about the only evidence being the rash.
A peculiarity of it is that many of the older people have contracted it and some have been quite sick. Previous experience with the disease does not seem to have gained anyone immunity as several older people who have previously had the measles have contracted them again. North Bend has had many more cases than Marshfield.

Epidemic At Eugene.

Concerning the disease at Eugene, the Guard says:
Eight new cases of measles were reported today to City Physician Comings, bringing the total in Eugene to well up above 100 cases. One flag was taken down today. The epidemic, it seemed some time ago, had reached its height in Eugene and for several weeks the number of flags taken down about equaled the new cases, but during the past week the new cases have been gaining. All of the cases are light, however, and while dangerous at all times, have not yet resulted in a single death. Quarantine is being maintained whenever a case is discovered and the danger from exposure to the malady is kept at a minimum.
