NEW COAL CO. IS ORGANIZED

Coquille-River Coal Co. Commences Operations at River-ton—Marshfield Offices

The Coquille River Coal Company is the name of a new enterprise recently organized for development of the coal resources of Coos County. The active members of the concern are all experienced coal operators, headed by Robert Harrison, an expert of thirty-three years' experience and for ten years foreman of the Northern Pacific Roslyn Mine at Roslyn, Washington. The other members of the operating company are Joseph Avena and Charles Avena. The company has taken a 20-year lease of 400 acres of coal land containing the Adams mine one mile above River-ton. A slope 350 feet has been opened showing a four-foot vein of coal that equals the best produced in Coos County. Large bunkers have been built at the mine and also at the river, with a track connecting with the mine.

Selling Company Organized

The output of the new mine will be handled by the Coos County Fuel Company, of which Geo. A. Baines of Marshfield, is general manager. Arrangements have already been perfected for opening branch agencies in Eandon, Myrtle Point, Coquille and North Bend, with the general offices in Marshfield. It is expected to place the first coal from the mine on the Coos Bay market next Tuesday.

If present plans materialize, it is expected by spring that the output of the mine will be increased to 100 tons daily. It is planned to ship considerable of this as the Coos County Fuel Company will have charge of the wholesaling as well as the local retail agencies.
