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### THE SERGE FROCK POSSESSES A CERTAIN SMARTNESS FOR THE HIGH SCHOOL GIRL.

Serge is not especially new, but it continues to be for almost all informal occasions one of the smartest and most favored of fabrics both in junior and grown-up modes.

One of the smart shops displayed the other day several imported models of blue serge for the girl of sixteen that were very alluring. One was trimmed with tiny red buttons and the pointed ends of the sash were braided in red silk soutache; another was trimmed with bright green. Both were simple, but unusually attractive.

The tiny lot is not forgotten by any means in the scheme of things this season. The same shop showed several small models that were equally fascinating. On one, the Russian blouse was of a dark red duvetyn trimmed with blue silk braid, and the

kilted skirt was of dark blue serge; another was of the blue serge, with collar, cuffs and a low belt of plaid silk.

In No. 7888, which is a design for a girl from 16 to 18, the effectiveness of bright silks as a relief to blue serge is well brought out. The sash is one of those new woven silk ashes, and the collar is of flowered silk ratine. Buttons and loops are red.
