CHARGE BARBER WITH ASSAULT

James McCall Swears Out
Warrant Against Beleu—
Trial on Today

Bert Beleu, who runs a barber shop on Front street, was arrested by Constable Cox yesterday afternoon on a warrant sworn out by James McCall charging assault and battery. The case will be tried before Justice Pennock this afternoon.
McCall owned the Spokane restaurant, which is in one side of the building occupied by the barber shop. He had the place up for sale and had sold it to a man named Stewart. It appears that Beleu had also arranged for another man to take over the place, on which the rent had been paid by McCall to Jan. 10.
McCall and Beleu began to argue the matter over and the former alleges the latter slapped his face and cussed him out. Stewart, who tried to move the fixtures he is said to have bought from McCall, also appeared before Justice Pennock yesterday afternoon, stating that he had also been hammered by Beleu. It is expected the trial will prove interesting.

Cutting Trees.—Secretary John Motley, of the Chamber of Commerce, has commenced having the trees cut away from in front of his pretty residence on North Broadway, overlooking the Bay. The clearing of the trees is improving the appearance of that section of the city.

Southeaster Again.—After a brief lull, the weather today started out with every prospect that the gales of the last few days would be again repeated, and the wind was increasing in velocity this afternoon. If the weather continues as at present it is expected that the boats from Portland will both be behind their schedule this week.

Fell in River.—Mr. Kromminga and his young son had a narrow escape from drowning in Coos River yesterday. While working in the river with a rowboat near the ranch of Mrs. S. A. Youkam, which they recently moved onto, their boat upset and they were unable to right it. After drifting about for quite a while, Mr. Johnson, another rancher living near them, saw their predicament and came to the rescue. Both were so encumbered by clothing that they could not swim.

WOMAN HELD FOR SHOOTING

Mrs. Lottie Cappious Bound
Over for Trying to Kill
Elmer Parkinson

Mrs. Lottie Cappious, charged with assaulting Elmer Parkinson in the Right Cafe last night about midnight with a pistol, waived a hearing before Justice Pennock this morning and was held to the grand jury in the sum of \$2000 on the charge of attempted murder. Parkinson swore out the complaint in the justice court early this morning.

Parkinson is employed as night waiter in the Right Cafe and Mrs. Cappious, at whose rooming house on Commercial street he used to reside, came into the place with Isabelle Bruner and some other person, according to the complainant. Mrs. Cappious ordered something to drink, she said, and on his stating that liquor was not served in the place, she pulled a pistol and shot at him. The bullet missed Parkinson and looking like blood for a moment, Parkinson was not hit, however, and ducked behind the counter. Witnesses state that Mrs. Cappious made a second determined effort to shoot him, but not being able to draw a bead on him, she started around the counter at the back, where she was grabbed and disarmed by the night cook, Frank Rogers.

Nightwatchman Doane arrived on the scene and arrested Mrs. Cappious, taking her to the city jail, where she remained until this morning. She was allowed to return to her home under the guard of a special officer and is awaiting the return of her husband from the McDonald-Vaughan camp, and will try to raise bail for her appearance before the grand jury.
As far as can be learned, the trouble which came to a climax last night has been brewing for some time, as Mrs. Cappious is said to have felt keenly Parkinson's leaving her roof for another boarding place.
