

# COOS CHAMPS ARE DEFEATED

Ben and Will Chandler Wallop Conrad and Kaufman in Handball Match

Will and Ben Chandler ably sustained their rights, title and interest in the championship of the state by decisively defeating J. W. Conrad and Ray Kaufman in a hand ball match late yesterday afternoon in the Tabernacle. The score was 23 to 31. The match was the outcome of a deft to all comers by Conrad and Kaufman, who claimed the championship of Coos and Curry counties. William and Benjamin scouted the idea that the two knew anything about the game and challenged accordingly. On Wednesday the teams tied in two games, and yesterday the deciding game was won by the Chandlers. The game was fiercely fought and Conrad and Kaufman did not go under without slaughtering the opposing forces. Superior marksmanship by their opponents overcame a lead of 14 to 6 held by Conrad and Kaufman early in the game, the score later being 17 to 11. Using lignite instead of black powder, however, the Chandler boys sank the enemy's ship in the final part of the contest, with the score as given in the opening paragraph. Conrad and Kaufman declare they were defeated by superior skill and speed and demand another chance, which will probably be given them in a series to be played next week.

Capt. Thomas Floyd is in charge of the tug Katie Cook.  
Excellent flour is \$5 per barrel retail on the Coquille.  
Mr. Lobree discharged the crew of his mill. He wants no "Aaronville bloods" in his'n.  
Naaburg & Hirst have sent to San Francisco for new machinery for the steamer Myrtle.  
Hon. R. H. Rosa was in town last Monday. He reports the Coquille bar all right but very rough.  
J. T. Moulton has completed the work on the construction of a wharf in front of his store at Coquille City.  
During 1880 29 marriages were solemnized in Coos and 14 in Curry. 200 vessels entered Coos Bay during the year.  
48,000 salmon were caught at Rogue River last fall, which worked up, yielded 9000 cases.  
James Brown retired from the position of engineer on the steamer Ceres, on the Coquille, last week, and J. A. Mack is now in charge.  
Capt. Edwards, of the steamer Little Annie, received a Christmas present. It's a girl and Charlie thinks it's "awful pretty."  
Capt. Parker passed through town last Monday on his way down to San Francisco for new machinery for the tug Katie Cook.
