**COOS COUNTY
TIMBER CRUISE**

Dennis McCarthy Files Report—Finds Over Eighteen Billion in 30 Townships

Dennis McCarthy, official timber cruiser for Coos County, yesterday filed his report with the Coos County Commissioners of the land cruised up to date. In about thirty townships, totaling 688,081 acres, the cruise totalled 18,312,856,000 feet of timber. This is an average of about 205,344.84 acres which had no timber, being swamp land or burned over areas, etc.
There remains about four townships of timber to cruise. This is rather scattered, there being about half a township near the head of Coos River and the balance in the south part of the county. Mr. McCarthy has had Jas. Cowan and some other expert cruisers assisting him. Mr. McCarthy is regarded as one of the best cruisers in Oregon.

REJECT PLAN ON COQUILLE

ARMY ENGINEERS OPPOSE FEDERAL AID FOR COQUILLE RIVER NEAR MYRTLE POINT—SAY PROJECT NOT FEASIBLE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 9.—The board of Army Engineers has reported adversely on a plan to improve the Coquille River between Coquille and Myrtle Point. The project was recommended by the District Engineer, who reported that a 60-foot channel, 3 1-2 half feet deep, could be established at a cost of \$15,000, with \$4000 annually for maintenance. He recommended the adoption of the plan, provided the local interests would bear half the cost. The Board of Engineers says the proposed dredged channel would deteriorate rapidly, and that the project was not feasible also because the prospective commerce was insufficient to justify the Government's undertaking the improvement, even with half the cost borne by the local community. An appeal from the decision can be filed within 30 days.

"MICKY" O'ROURKE ALIVE.

Failure To Come Ashore Causes Much Anxiety.

A Portland paper says: After several months of inactivity, "Micky" O'Rourke, chief engineer on Columbia River light vessel No. 88, and hero of a number of John Fleming Wilson's tales of the sea, has broken into the limelight again through fears of his sister, Mrs. E. Clinton Heatley of Richmond, Cal., that he might be dead.

Mrs. Heatley telegraphed to Light-house Inspector Beck, asking if Michael O'Rourke is dead or alive, to which he answered that the chief engineer is alive and well aboard the lightskip. Since he was sandbagged and robbed at San Francisco about a year ago, "Micky" O'Rourke has not been ashore, preferring to take his chances with his pay checks aboard the light vessel.
