NORTH BEND IS TWICE VICTOR

Beats Marshfield High School and Independent Basketball Teams

North Bend took both games in the basketball contests here last night. The North Bend High School defeated the Marshfield High School 39 to 18 and the North Bend Independents defeated the Marshfield Independents 59 to 18. The games drew the largest crowd in a long time, over 350 being taken in at the gate and the attendance being estimated at over two hundred. There was considerable complaint over the work of Referee Lafferty of North Bend, and following the game it was decided that in the future the coaches of the teams should not be allowed to officiate. BRINGING NO MORE LABORERS

Pat L. Burr Returns From San Francisco and Leaves for Myrtle Point

Pat L. Burr, of the contracting firm of Willett & Burr, working on the construction of the Smith-Powers logging road out of Myrtle Point, returned to Marshfield today on the Redondo from a three weeks' visit in San Francisco during the Christmas and New Year holidays. He left this afternoon for Myrtle Point to inspect the work being done out at the camp. Mr. Burr stated that the contracting firm had not brought any laborers from the outside for several weeks as enough help could be found among the men requiring work in the county. He reported that there were about 5000 men out of work in San Francisco, but that efforts by the city to aid them had resulted in an influx of thousands of men from other parts of California. He said that the men had refused to work for \$2.50 a day, although the jobs provided for them were given as an emergency, and that the payment of \$3 a day had resulted in men quitting jobs elsewhere and flocking to the higher pay in San Francisco. The result was that the plan to give help to those out of work had ended in rows and no benefit was obtained by the men. He reported that a great many I. W. W.'s were also active among the ranks of the workers.

REDONDO HAS FINE PASSAGE

Heavy General Cargo and Good List of Passengers From San Francisco

Enjoying a fine passage up the coast from San Francisco, the steamer Redondo, Captain Erickson, arrived in the harbor shortly after daylight this morning and after discharging freight and passengers at North Bend and drums of oil at the Standard Oil dock, berthed the Alliance dock in Marshfield to discharge a heavy general cargo. Rough weather was experienced the first couple of hundred miles out of San Francisco, but the Redondo enjoyed a fine weather the remainder of the voyage. The anniversary date is January 25, but as this happens to be on a Sunday, the celebration will be held the previous evening. Loggie's hall was selected as the place in which the affair will be held. All Scots and direct descendants of them are expected to attend. Peter Loggie and Dan McDonald represented the North Bend Scots at the meeting, Marshfield being represented by Messrs. Todd, E. D. McArthur, William McKay and Andrew Landies. Andrew Landies and Dan McDonald were selected to form a committee to arrange for the program. The celebration will consist of speeches on the life of the famous poet, Scotch dances, playing of bagpipes, reading of selections from Burns' works, music and a general social time. GRACE DOLLAR SAILS SOUTH

Carrying a heavy cargo of lumber, with a deckload secured at the railroad dock in Marshfield, the steam schooner, Grace Dollar, Captain Fosson, sailed over the bar for the south today at 11 o'clock, taking with her, so far as can be learned, T. M. Carr, the first assistant engineer, who ran wild on the streets of Marshfield the night before last in an almost naked condition.
