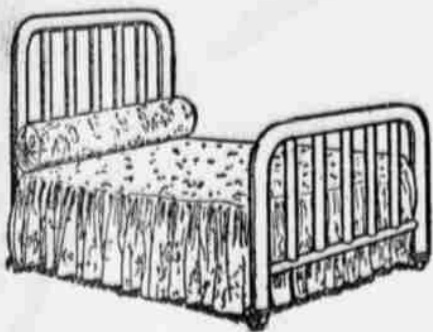

Season Closes.—Deputy Game Warden Thomas says the hunting season for all migratory birds closes January 15 and he hopes that all will abide by the law. He says he does not wish to prosecute nearly so much as to prevent violations of the law.

To Repair Sign.—The Bandon recorder says: A. D. Mills is circulating a petition for money to repair the big Coquille Valley advertising sign which was wrecked recently at Coos Bay by the winds and high tides. Everybody ought to help with this proposition as it is a very necessary one.

Improving Hotel.—L. J. Justin, of Portland, and brother of Mrs. E. W. Sullivan, of the Lloyd Hotel, has arrived in the city and will go into business with E. W. Sullivan, who is having the Coos Hotel rehabilitated. A force of men is busy putting the plastering in decent shape and improving the plumbing of the Coos Hotel, which will reopen shortly.

Bandon Water Case.—George P. Laird, of Bandon, was a Marshfield visitor last night. He reports that R. H. Corey of Marshfield is to file the appraisal of the valuation of the Bandon waterworks with the Bandon city council within a few days and a special election is to be

called to determine whether or not the city will buy it at the price the appraisers have fixed.

For Judge.—W. C. Chase, formerly State Senator, has formally announced his candidacy for County Judge.

Relative Dead.—Word has been received here of the death of Henry Fiske Drollinger at Roseburg Thursday. He was a brother of Mrs. H. B. Granby and Herbert Drollinger, of Marshfield.

Girls South.—Rev. H. C. Cooley, formerly of the M. E. Church, leaves on the Redondo to take a position in the State Normal School at Natchitoches, La. Mrs. Cooley and the children will remain on Catching Inlet for a month or two.

Hall-Lewis Chosen.—P. M. Hall-Lewis, Coos County Roadmaster, has been re-elected City Engineer of Coquille, a position he retired from to take the county position. Mayor Morrison was opposed to him, but deferred to the wishes of the majority of the Council.

All for Good Roads.—Voters have begun registering for the new year at Justice Penneck's office and at the Chamber of Commerce, and during the first day there was not a single person who missed signing the petitions calling for an election on the bond issue for good roads in Coos County. The indications are that the election will be called by an overwhelming majority.

Bandon Booming.—Dr. L. P. Sorenson, of Bandon, was a Marshfield business visitor last night. He reports Bandon going ahead at a great pace. The opening of the new street is improving the business district immensely and in addition to the new buildings now going up, a Bandon clothing merchant purchased a \$15,000 corner there a couple of days ago and will soon start a fine business block.

To Sail March 1.—Latest information regarding the big steamer Nann Smith, which has been lying up at the C. A. Smith mill during the fall and winter months, is that she will re-enter the coast lumber trade about the first of March. She is now undergoing a thorough overhauling and painting and will be in fine shape for her first trip south this year. It is understood that no attempt will be made to enlarge her passenger accommodations, as at first proposed.

Meat Market Changes.—The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "C. A. Gourley is moving back to Myrtle Point. A change has recently been made in the meat business firms here was interested in. Mr. Jones, who was interested with Mr. Gourley at Marshfield and Mr. Sanders, who was his partner here, have incorporated as the Palace Meat Company. Mr. Jones continues in charge at Marshfield and Mr. Sanders at this place, while Mr. Gourley will divide his time between the two shops."

To Seek Ducks.—Tom James, J. W. Conrad, Ray Kaufman, Jack Kendall and Arthur Peck will leave this evening for Haynes Inlet to take a last bang at the ducks before the close of the season for the waterfowl on January 15. All are reputed to be dead shots, and if they are able to aim straight a wholesale slaughter of the luckless ducks is expected by the little army which will be watching early in the morning for the prospective victims.
