**The Woman's Corner**

**The Preventive Ounces, or Truth Stranger Than Fiction.**

I will state only facts that have come under my personal knowledge, the most pathetic side of some that never was manifest to the world, and which I may omit in this story.  
When I was a young girl, a neighbor, a young married woman—a prospective mother—came to our home and asked my mother to give her some sewing to do, for which she would gladly receive for payment some necessary nutritious articles of food.

Her husband, a large able-bodied man, commanded good wages and could find plenty of work to do, but he was a slave to the demon of the still, and oblivious of all the demands of affection and duty—of the sacred vow given at the marriage altar scarce a twelvemonth before—was squandering all his earnings at the shrine of Bacchus.

The wee stranger opened its sweet baby eyes and looked upon the things of earth only a few brief months and never knew the anguish of a sorrowing mother or the sins of the father, for they closed to open in a brighter, happier place, where there is no sorrow or sinning. Though my mother needed no help (for she had large girls of her own) but her tender heart readily gave the wished for work and the food plentifully. Oh, if lawmakers only had a tender mother's heart, how much suffering and sin might be avoided; the ounces of prevention would save many pounds of cure.

Later another sweet little boy came to cheer and bless the sorrowing, broken-hearted mother. It had arrived at the age when it could first toddle about and slip cunning words, so dear to the loving mother, when one day as it was playing with the bricks that were used in place of a missing leg of the old broken stove, and some way loosening one a trifle, the stove tilted and sent the contents of a kettle of boiling water on the tender, innocent baby, and after many hours of intense anguish, he, too, was "Safe in the Arms of Jesus."

We will here drop the curtain on the remaining chapters of tragedies of that woman's story and speak of another.  
A farmer went to town for a load of wood. He was cordially invited by a friend to step into a saloon for a drink and to warm up, as it was a cold day. The snake in the glass aroused the demon of appetite and several drinks followed, and time, which never waits, passed into night before he started home. In his maudlin condition the team was driven into the ditch, the load upset and the man was found the next morning frozen to death, gone to a drunkard's doom! Sequel: Bills for fuel and supplies for a needy family drawn on the public treasury—orphans and a widow! How many pounds of cure was necessary?

One more: The wife of an habitual toper came to my rooms one morning (the family, husband, wife and one little girl occupied rooms in the same building) and with fright and great agitation expressed in every feature, begged me to come to their rooms, her "man" was acting so bad she was "awfully afraid."

I found the man in a severe attack of delirium tremens, with scarcely any fire, no fuel and not a particle of food, but a few spoonfuls of coffee and a part of a raw cabbage. The man had lost his job some days before for pilfering from his employer's till to gratify his intolerable thirst for drink. Of course I notified the "powers that be" and help was soon obtained. Sequel: In three weeks' time, the wife, unable to bear up under her heavy burdens (being naturally delicate) succumbed—and bills for living expenses, nurse, doctor and funeral expenses were drawn on Uncle Sam's credit. But worse than all was the fate of the motherless little girl left behind.
