NEWS OF NEARBY TOWNS

COOS COUNTY DAIRIES.

Manufactured Over 1,000,000 Pounds of Butter Last Year. During the past year Coos County has produced over 1,000,000 pounds of butter, 750,000 pounds of cheese, and about 40,000 cases of condensed milk. There are in Coos County fourteen creameries, where butter or cheese are manufactured and one condensed milk plant. There are about 300 dairy farms and 7000 dairy cows. The total amount of cash paid to the farmers for their milk and cream totals over \$500,000 for the year. This is an average of \$1600 cash for every dairy farm and \$70 per cow. In many of the herds the cows have produced \$100 each for the year. The average assessed valuation of a dairy cow in Coos County is \$36, one-half of the annual cash production.—Coquille Sentinel.

FINE NORTH BENDERS.

Two fellows of the class that the world terms "would-be sports," were arrested by Marshal Brown last Monday afternoon for speeding the horses they were riding on the city streets and across and on the sidewalks. The men, who gave their names as Tiffney and Cambell and said they hailed from North Bend, were brought before City Recorder Dodge, pleaded guilty and were fined \$15 each, which they paid. The emulators of the "Montgomery Ward Cowboy of the Plains" were at first inclined to consider the price of their "joy" a little high and intimated that they would stand trial, but finally decided to "come across" before they got in deeper.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

SLANDER IN CURRY

The Gold Beach Globe says: Some careless town joker started the yarn that E. W. Miller, the butcher, had bought John Ham's dead horse for hog feed. Such yarns as this should not even be told as a joke, as there is always some ready to believe any gossip they hear. Both Messrs. Miller and Ham feels hurt at the report and the one responsible should make due apology. Mr. Miller would not think of such a thing, and Mr. Ham regarded the horse as one member of the family, otherwise he would not have given it such a humane burial.

CREAMERY AT BANDON.

The Bandon Creamery made 75,000 pounds of butter last year and paid out \$22,000 to its patrons. Of this amount 50,000 pounds was shipped to outside markets and the balance was consumed locally. The average test for the year 1912 was 35 per cent and what looks best to its patrons, it has paid up in full all its outstanding indebtedness.—Bandon Surf.

COL. MICHE IN RIVER

New Coos Bay Bar Dredge to be Tested at Rainier for Week. A Portland paper says: "In command of Captain J. C. Reed, formerly skipper of the bartug Wallula under the O.-W. R. & N. flag and later under the Port of Portland Commission, the new Government sea-going dredge Col. P. S. Michie, built at Seattle for service on the Coos Bay bar, came into the Columbia River Friday to pass a week under test. She is to proceed to Rainier and remove a shoal in the channel. When that is accomplished she is to continue to Coos Bay and operate on the bar. Major Morrow, Corps of Engineers, United States Army, who is to have charge of the dredge, went to Astoria to inspect her, also to accompany Colonel Thomas H. Rees, division engineer with headquarters at San Francisco, who awarded a contract to Wilson Brothers, of Astoria, for a steam propeller to be used about the Golden Gate. Colonel Rees is to return at once to his district.

STORM IN CURRY

Severe Wind and Rainstorm Sweeps That Section. The Gold Beach Globe says: The severest wind and rain storm that has swept this coast for many years has been raging the past week. The roads have been blocked with fallen timber and the telephone wires in all directions have been out of commission. Streams have been swollen out of their banks, causing the arrivals of the mail at this point from one to twenty-four hours late. The most damage from wind is reported from Wedderburn. The net house was completely demolished and the front of the store building, which was of a square finish, was torn from the building and laid in the street. The unusual heavy surf on top of the extreme high water, made the highest water on the lower river seen in many years. The water was all over the flat, flooding the Blake and Smithy houses to a depth of several inches. The family occupying the Smithy house moved out, but was soon able to return. No serious damage was done here except the blowing down of old fences and a few shingles from several of the buildings.

Definite announcement has not been made that the shops will be at Springfield, but it appears certain from the above remark that they will not be located elsewhere.
