## MAYOR KITTSON FELL IN BAY

Councilman McLaggan Rescues Official This Morning Near Smith Mill

Robert Kittson, Mayor of Eastside, this morning had a rather narrow escape from possible drowning in Isthmus Inlet. He was rescued with the aid of Mr. McLaggan, a member of the Eastside Council. They were en route to work at the mill when the accident occurred. Mr. Kittson stepped from his boat onto a duck scow and the latter suddenly overturned, throwing him into deep water. Mr. McLaggan was near and immediately came to his aid and Mr. Kittson was brought to safety, badly drenched. The mill men declare that Mr. McLaggan is entitled to a Carnegie hero medal for his prompt rescue.

## BIG MILL TO BE BUILT SOUTH OF BROOKINGS

Report That Wisconsin Company Will Develop Holding South of Brookings

GOLD BEACH, Or., Jan. 12.—According to an apparently authentic but unofficial report received from Brookings and Crescent an immense lumber mill is to be put below Brookings probably this year. The projectors are said to be the company from East Wisconsin, which owns the largest body of redwood in the west. Del Norte County, California, who are said to be planning a mill with 600,000 daily capacity pulp mill in connection, the mill to be operated like the C. A. Company's pulp mill in Marshfield to utilize the waste from the mill.
