MORE VOTING PRECINCTS

Commissioners Increase Number in Coos County From 39 to 56.

The Coos County Commissioners at the January session, completed the re-establishing of the voting precincts of the county to comply with the law, the granting of suffrage to women necessitating increasing the number in the county from 39 to 56. Marshfield now has four precincts, Coquille four, Myrtle Point two, Bandon four and North Bend three. The description of the Coos Bay precincts as just outlined is as follows:

Precinct No. 16, Eastside—All lying within city limits of Eastside.

Precinct No. 17, Marshfield N.—All that part within the city limits of Marshfield lying north of Alder avenue, Birch avenue and Seventh Court North.

Precinct No. 18, Marshfield Central No. 2.—All that part within the city limits of Marshfield lying between Alder avenue, Birch avenue and Seventh Court North and Central avenue.

Precinct No. 19, Marshfield Central No. 1.—All that part within the city limits of Marshfield lying between Central avenue and Elrod avenue.

Precinct No. 20, Marshfield South.—All that part within the city limits of Marshfield lying south of Elrod avenue.

Precinct No. 21, Bunker Hill.—All that part of sections 34, 35 and 36 lying south of the city limits of Marshfield and Eastside in T. 25, S. R. 13 W., except the east half S. E. section 36. West half section 1, all section 2, lot 1 section 3, east half and east half of west half section 11, west half section 12, T. 26, S. R. 13 W.

Precinct No. 7, North Bend.—All within the city limits of North Bend lying east of Pony Inlet and north of California street.

Precinct No. 8, North Bend Central.—All within the city limits of North Bend lying east of Pony Inlet and Oregon street.

Precinct No. 9, North Bend S.—All within the city limits of North Bend lying east of Pony Inlet and south of Oregon street.

Precinct No. 10, North Bend W.—All within the city limits of North Bend lying west of Pony Inlet.

Precinct No. 11, Pony Slough.—North half section 17, N. E. S. E. and south half S. E. 17, south half N. W. and S. W. 16 east half section 20, all of the S. W. quarter section 20 south of the south line of city limits of Empire, N. W. quarter and south half section 21, S. W. 22, all the S. E. 22 lying between the city limits of North Bend and Marshfield, W half sec. 27 all sec. 28 and 29, 32 and 33, all sec. 34 outside the city limits of Marshfield.

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ANNUAL REPORT IS SUBMITTED

Total Circulation of Volumes at Public Library for Year is 16,205.

The annual report of the library board, for the year ending November, 1913, turned in to the City Council on Monday night, shows that the total circulation of volumes in the public library for the year was 16,205. The report was approved by the Council members.

The largest circulation for one day in the last year was 132, the smallest being 16. The library was open on 305 days and on an average of 48 hours a week. The average daily circulation was 53. The number of borrower's cards issued, including those at the end of 1912, was 1935, of which 56 were dropped, leaving a total of 1879.

The number of volumes at the beginning of 1913 was 2993. The additions were 522 and the withdrawals 39, the actual number of books belonging to the library at the end of the year being 2495. The number of magazines bound is 48.

Roseburg Paper Pays High Tribute to Former Resident

Mrs. Drollinger is expected home soon from Roseburg to make her home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. Hansen on Central avenue. She has been at Roseburg for several months during the fatal illness of her husband. A Roseburg paper gives the following particulars of his death:

Henry Fiske Drollinger, aged 23 years, and a native Douglas County boy, died at the home of his mother, Mrs. Mary Drollinger, on South Pine street, after a lingering illness. The funeral will be held at the family home tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock. Interment of the remains following in the family burial lot, in Edenhower. Rev. W. H. Eaton, pastor of the local Baptist Church, will officiate at the funeral. Other than being survived by a wife and infant son, the deceased leaves a mother, Mrs. Mary Drollinger, and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. F. J. Damon and Mrs. A. P. Hillhouse, of Portland; Mrs. H. B. Granby and Herbert Drollinger, of Marshfield; Wilbur Drollinger, of Vancouver; Mrs. L. L. Lewis and W. M. Drollinger, of Roseburg. The deceased was a member of the Woodmen of the World and was well known in this city. He was a young man of exemplary habits and his death is regretted by all who chanced to make his acquaintance. The young man had been ill for a long time, and notwithstanding that everything possible had been done to relieve his suffering he grew steadily worse until his death. 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BRETT SAYS SPENCER BAD

North Bend Man Declares Indicted Forger Wrongfully Accused Him

Brett said that he had tried to help Spencer out and the latter seems to have decided to hurt his reputation.
