R. A. Wernich, H. J. McKeown and W. J. Hill were three of the last Coos Bay nimrods to avail themselves of the last opportunity to bag a few ducks on the last day of the open season, which was yesterday. Incidentally, Mr. Wernich got one "duck" that neither he nor his associates will forget in a long time.

To make sure of getting the limit, they started about five o'clock in the morning for the Glasgow Gun Club, or rather, arranged to start. A little before five, they started for their launch. All went well until they reached the dock and Mr. Wernich started down the incline. All of a sudden his feet shot out from under him and the next thing he knew he was under water. When Mr. Wernich's feet were sticking up over the edge of the slip, his toes having caught on the little rail. Otherwise he was under water. The two were too dumbfounded to grab him and Hill says that McKeown was so startled that he was hollering instructions to Wernich as to what to do when Wernich's head was about four feet under water and only his feet above. In another instant his toe hold slipped and he was all under. A moment later, he bobbed up and grabbed the slip and was out.

However, a little ducking wasn't offered to spoil the hunt and a sick return to the Chandler furnished dry clothing for him and they went out and got the limit.
