TAFT FIGHTS AUTO TAX.

NEW HAVEN, Jan. 16.—Professor William Howard Taft of Yale is dissatisfied with the tax levied on his automobile by the city. He received notice that the assessors had rated his machine as worth \$4500. To this 10 per cent had been added for Taft's failure to appear within the specified time and swear to the tax list. That brought the total assessment to \$4950.

In a letter to the assessors today Taft informed them he had purchased the car second-handed, paying only \$2000 for it and fails to understand how they can rate it at assessed figures.

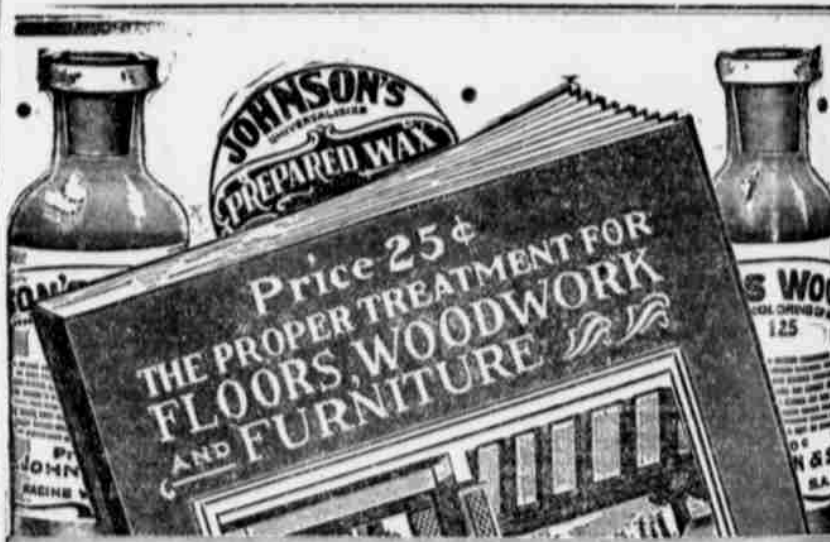
