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DONATES LAND AT FLORENCE

Geo. M. Miller Gives Half Mile of Waterfrontage for Public Dock.

EUGENE, Or., Jan. 16.—George M. Miller, of this city, who owns large tracts of land in and around Florence, has donated to the Port of Siuslaw Commission half a mile of water front in that city to be used for public wharves.

Ever since the Port of Siuslaw was incorporated the question of obtaining sites for public docks at the different towns on the river has been agitated and the question as far as Florence is concerned has been solved by this generous donation by Mr. Miller.

Mr. Miller is the pioneer real estate promoter of Florence and for years has dreamed of a great seaport there. His optimism has never waned, even through many years of inactivity in that section of the county. At the present time, more than ever, with the building of the Eugene-Coos Bay railroad to give rail transportation, he foresees a great future for the little city by the sea. He realizes the need of public docks, and is making this donation in order to save the city the expense and trouble of buying the land at some future date when it would be worth more than it is now.

In a letter offering this land to the Port Commission, Mr. Miller says:

"Realizing the uncertainty of life, the deed is made at this time in order to insure future generations against the possibilities of being required to pay large sums for dock sites as is being done in other harbors on the coast. This donation is also in order to encourage the Port Commissioners in the good work they are doing and to show an appreciation of that work. The great state of Oregon, with its six hundred miles of waterfront, has no good harbor—nowhere that a boat drawing more than 24 feet of water can land and discharge her cargo.

"I hope the Port of Siuslaw will continue improvements until vessels of 35 feet may enter the Siuslaw Bay. When this is done the property here-

CITY'S PLANTS PAY PROFITS

Eugene Derives Net Income of Over \$15,000 From Electric and Water Systems

EUGENE, Or., Jan. 16.—That the total revenue of the combined water and light plants of the city of Eugene is nearly \$100,000 for the past year is shown by the semi-annual report, filed with the city council last evening, together with the figures made public last July, at the close of the first half of the fiscal year. Less than two-thirds of these revenues were required for the operating expenses and the interest on the investment and from the surplus over \$25,000 was expended in extensions and repairs. This amount just about cared for the depreciation of the plants, leaving over \$15,000 to be applied on sinking fund.

The report shows in detail the cost of the two plants to be \$541,062.37, as they stand today, and also presents detailed statements of the cost of operation and maintenance for each department.

In the deed to the property Mr. Miller makes the provision that all railroad tracks laid thereon must be for the use of any company that might build its lines to Florence, that no charges for dockage shall be made and that no lease on the property shall be made for a longer period than ten years.
