HIRAM C. GILL TO RUN AGAIN

Seattle's Recalled Mayor to Become Candidate for Same Office Again

SEATTLE, Jan. 17.—Hiram C. Gill, elected Mayor in 1910, recalled for misconduct in less than a year, and defeated by Mayor Cotterill in 1912, has announced that he would be a candidate again for Mayor in the approaching campaign. In a letter to the men and women of Seattle, Gill

says: "I have made up my mind to become a candidate that I may, if successful, demonstrate that in the past of what my political enemies call Gillism also passed all there was that permitted the conditions which led to my recall. No one realizes more than I that such conditions are forever impossible in this city."

Ejectment Suit Ended.—The case of Motley vs. Timmerman, which was brought up before Judge Benson at Coquille yesterday, was disposed of rather suddenly when the suit was thrown out of court on a question of law that the ejectment action desired in the suit was invalid. The plaintiff took a voluntary non-suit in the action, but will appeal to the Supreme Court against the costs of the case being assessed against Mrs. Annie Stickney, whom the plaintiff represented.
