The figured silks with their quaint printed designs are especially suited to combinations of this description. An excellent illustration of a figured blouse and plain skirt is given in 8094. Russian green duvetyn fashions the skirt and the panel on the front of the blouse. The blouse itself is made of a figured silk serge in which there are minglings of green, blue and red.
