



Rainbow on Run.—The steamer Rainbow, Captain E. G. Smith, plying between Marshfield and Coos River, resumed her run today, having been held up for repairs for the past two days.

Land Suit Dropped.—The case of Harry Monigetti against H. M. Davenport, for non-residence on a homestead, was to be heard before U. S. Land Commissioner A. K. Peck in Marshfield today. Attorney Powell was on hand in behalf of the defendant to proceed, but the plaintiff or his legal representatives did not put in an appearance, and the case will go by default.

Note Alleged Overdue.—Charging that a promissory note of \$200 for the balance of the payments on a horse, wagon and harness sold to Charles Lapp is overdue, James Scott entered an attachment on the horse and vehicle this morning in Justice Pennock's court and Constable Scott served the attachment papers, after which he had the horse and wagon taken from Able's barn and taken to Mulloy's barn until the judgment is satisfied or the case settled.

Seeks Mother's Pension.—A Portland paper announces that Mrs. Emily La France, wife of J. C. La France, who is now serving a five year term in state's prison for defrauding insurance companies, is seeking a mother's pension of \$32.50 per month in Multnomah county. Mrs. La France was arrested in Coquille when her husband was taken into custody there for substituting another body for his own and having his wife collect \$15,000 life insurance. She was not prosecuted.

Dog Licenses Required.—Marshal Carter, who posted a notice recently that all dogs in the city must have licenses secured for them and that the tags should be worn by the animals, declares there is going to be a wholesale "slaughter of the innocents" after the end of the month unless more interest is shown by dog owners to "pay the piper." Carter will promptly nab every "purr" without a tag

on February 1, and the pets will be held for a brief period, after which, if no interest is shown in the defendants, they will be sentenced to death.
